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

THE MIDLAND COUNTIES ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting was held at Burton-on-Trent on Monday, March 28th. The bells of St. Modwen's, St. Paul's, and St. Mark's (Winshill) were available for ringing from 10 a.m., and were kept going in various methods throughout the day. Members were present from Ashby, Barwell, Cotgrave, Derby, Duffield, Etwall, Ilkeston, London, Loughborough, Mansfield, Newhall, North Wingfield, Nottingham, Nuneaton, Ripley, Stanton-by-Dale, Southwell, Whitwick, Wirksworth, Wolverhampton, and Burton. By the kindness of Messrs. Worthington, the celebrated brewers, arrangements had been made for the whole party to make a tour of their extensive and elaborate brewery premises, and about one hundred members and friends were provided with refreshments at 11.0. Parties were afterwards shown over the malthouses, hop rooms, stores, cooperages. etc., the visitors being greatly interested In all they saw.

Committee meeting was held in St. Paul's Institute at 3.15, and tea, followed by the general meeting, at 4 o'clock. Sir Arthur Heywood, Bart. (president), was in the chair, supported by the Vicar (Rev. J. J. G. Stockley), Canon Worthington (Rector of Netherseal), Rev. T. A. Lewis (Vicar of Horningdon), Mr. J. W. Taylor (vice-President), Mr. W. E. White (hon. sec.), Mr. W. C. Wakley (hon. treasurer), Mr. E. D. Taylor, and others, eighty-four members sitting down. Apologies for absence were read by the Vicar from several clergy and gentlemen, including the two auditors (Revs. J. P. Hales and M. H. Pimm). After the minutes of the last meeting at Eastwood had

After the minutes of the last meeting at Eastwood had been read and passed, the President reviewed the peals rung during the last quarter, which amounted to eighteen, while the annual report (just published) for 1909 showed a grand total of 154 peals, creating a record for the Association both in number and in quality. Sir Arthur hoped that the advance made in the higher methods would tend to greater care being taken in the ringing, and ensure good striking.

Seventeen members were unanimously elected. The balance-sheet was read and adopted, on the proposition of Mr. Draper, seconded by Mr. Fox, the President remarking that he hoped, by the new arrangements made, the Association would be financially sound once more in a couple of years.

The general officers were unanimously re-elected, on the proposition of Mr. Griffin, seconded by Mr. Maskrey. Mr. Taylor, Mr. White, and Mr. Wakley briefly replied.

Sir Arthur Heywood announced that the committee recommended that an honorarium of £5 be offered to the Secretary for his services, as the duties of the secretaryship had greatly increased during the past few years. He knew that Mr. White had almost more than he could do to carry out the work, and he could not be allowed to sustain a dead loss. He moved that the committee's recommendation be passed. This was seconded by Mr. Griffin, and carried with applause.

The quarterly meetings for the ensuing year were fixed to take place at Alfreton, Loughborough, and Melton

Mowbray, in the order named, the next annual meeting being at Derby by rotation. A proposition by Mr. W. C. Wakley to divide the extensive Derby district into two, with Chesterfield as the centre of the new district, was approved, and referred to a select committee to arrange the details. A vote of thanks to the clergy and churchwardens for the use of the bells and Institute was proposed by Mr. W. W. Worthington, and seconded by Mr. J. W. Taylor. The Vicar, in reply, said that he was always very pleased to do his best for his friends the ringers, and to welcome the Association to Burton.

Mr. Argyle proposed a vote of thanks to the Messrs. Worthington for their entertainment in the morning, which was highly appreciated. This was seconded by Mr. Draper, and carried with applause. Mr. Worthington replied in a few words. A hearty vote of thanks to Sir Arthur Heywood for presiding closed the meeting.

During the day touches of Grandsire, Stedman, Plain Bob, Treble Bob, Double Norwich, Duffield, and Superlative were rung, and in the evening the Derby band rang tunes, and courses of Grandsire Caters and Cinques, with a touch of Stedman Triples, on the handbells.

THE ESSEX ASSOCIATION.

A very successful meeting of the north-eastern district of the above was held at Colchester on Easter Monday last, the Master of the Association presiding. The elections of members included the Rev. A. F. Curtis, the new Vicar of Feering, as an honorary member, and nine ringing members.

Votes of thanks were passed to the Vicar of St. Peter's, Colchester, for the use of the bells, and also to Mr. Page and the local ringers for making the arrangements for tea, etc. During the day touches were rung of Grandsire, Bob Major, Kent and Oxford Treble Bob, Double Norwich, and Superlative. A peal of the latter was rung earlier in the day, in which several of the local ringers scored their first in that method.

THE WINCHESTER DIOCESAN GUILD.

A meeting for combined practice and business was held at the church of St. Thomas a'Becket, Portsmouth, on Easter Monday last. Ringers were present from the following towers: Portsmouth, Postsea, Fareham, Havant, Petersfield, Titchfield, and Swanmore; also visitors from North Stonham and Guildford. The bells were raised at 3.30, and touches were attempted, but not much ringing was done before tea. At five o'clock a short service was held in the church, at which all the ringers attended. The lessons were read by the Master of the Association (Rev. C. E. Matthews, of Titchfield), the prayers being read by the Rev. R. A. Medlicott, Vicar of St. Thomas's, who gave a very helpful address to the ringers, taking for his text an inscription on a bell in the Midlands—"Jesus speaks." He likened all Churchworkers, including the bellringers, as speaking to the congregation, and urged the necessity of all who took part in God's work to lead upright lives,

so that they might be an example worthy for others to follow.

After service the company repaired to the Institute for tea, twenty-two sitting down. The business meeting was held in the adjoining room, the Rev. C. E. Matthews in the chair, supported by Mr. Whiting (district secretary), Mr. E. J. Harding (district representative), and others. The minutes of the previous meeting were confirmed. Altogether twenty-eight full and probationary members were admitted into the Guild. It was decided to send an instructor to Liss to teach change-ringing to the ringing company there.

Business over, the Master said a few appropriate words concerning the loss to the Exercise by the decease of the

Rev. F. E. Robinson.

Votes of thanks were accorded to the Rev. R. A. Medlicott for the use of the bells and meeting-room, also the Master for presiding. The ringers then adjourned to the tower, where they were successful in ringing touches of Grandsire, Stedman, and Bob Major.

ARCHDEACONRY OF STAFFORD SOCIETY.

The annual meeting was held at Lichfield on Monday, March 28th. Members attended from Birmingham, Bloxwich, Coseley, Handsworth, Haughton, Lichfield, Market Drayton, Rugeley, Tamworth, Walsall, Wednesbury, West Bromwich, Wolverhampton, and Wombourn.

The use of the cathedral belts was somewhat minimised by the authorities that be, but were turned to the best

account by those present.

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The committee meeting was held in the cathedral belfry at 12.45, Mr. J. E. Groves (ringing master) presiding. Then followed a short service in St. Mary's church, conducted by the Rev. E. V. Cox.

The tea had been arranged to be partaken of in the Wade-street schools, but owing to scarlet fever having made its appearance therein, provision was made by the caterer (Mr. Wigham) at his stores in Tamworth-street,

where a splendid tea was done full justice to.

The general meeting followed in the Pool-walk schools, where the desks were so small that some of the more corpulent found it difficult to settle themselves comfortably. Mr. R. Cartwright was unanimously voted to the chair, and he filled the position admirably. After the minutes of the previous meeting had been passed, the Rev. E. V. Cox read the report for the past year (nine months), and presented the balance-sheet, the latter showing a substantial balance in hand. The officers were re-elected, except that Mr. T. J. Elton (of Walsall) succeeds Mr. J. E. Groves (retired) as ringing-master. The next three quarterly (retired) as ringing-master. The next three quarterly meetings were settled for Tamworth (June), Bloxwich (September), and Brierley Hill (January. In order to reach outlying towers, those who are the happy possessors of bicycles are invited to attend special ringing meetings from time to time, notice of which will appear in this paper. It is thought much good may be done in this way, as some of the towers in the archdeaconry are otherwise difficult to get at.

A new and improved design for certificate of member-

ship is in course of preparation.

Votes of thanks to Mr. Groves for his past services, and to Mr. Cartwright for conducting the business of the

meeting, terminated the proceedings.

This is the first attempt at having a full day for the annual meeting, which taking all things into consideration, proved a success.

THE EAST DERBYSHIRE ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting was held ai Shirland, on Monday, March 28th. The unusual sight to the visitors of fifty ringers parading the streets, and besieging the ancient parish church, caused a considerable stir and surprise in this usually quiet village.

South Wingfield; with several ringers' wives.

The annual service was held at 4.30 p.m., and was well attended. The Rev. B. Hallows, Rector, preached a very

impressive sermon.

Tea was provided in the school at 5.30 p.m., to which fifty sat down. Adjourning to the next room the annual meeting was held, the Rector occupying the chair. The balance-sheet was read and confirmed, showing a balance in hand of £13 18s. 7d., which was considered satisfactory.

The Rev. B. Hallows was elected president for ensuing year; Mr. J. Smith (Clay Cross) was re-elected treasurer; and Mr. T. Allibone (North Wingfield) was re-elected

secretary.

Quarterly meetings were arranged for Heath, Crich, and Clay Cross, with special meetings for Horsley and Wingerworth. The voting for the place for the next annual meeting resulted in Blackwell being selected. Hearty votes of thanks were given to the Rector for preaching, presiding, and granting the use of the bells for the day, also the retiring offices for their past services.

The bells were kept merrily going until 9 p.m., a very enjoyable day being spent by all, the weather being all

that could be desired.

THE NORWICH DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

A quarterly general meeting of this Association was held at Kenninghall on Easter Monday. SIXTY FEET FALL DOWN CLIFFS.

A cliff tragedy, resulting in a young man's death and terrible injuries to his lady companion, came to light at Llantwit Major, South Wales, in the early hours of Monday morning last. Miss Cranogwen Lewis, aged eighteen, of 52, Brook Street, Aberman, Aberdare, was on a visit to Llantwit Major, and on Sunday evening attended service at the parish church. Later she accompanied Mr. George Kibblewhite, aged nineteen, son of Mr. G. E. Kibblewhite, schoolmaster, of Wick for a walk. The young couple walked to the neighbourhood known as Dimhole, between St. Donat's Castle and Dimlands. It appears that they there got on the wrong footpath, and walking blindly on, stepped over the cliffs. Falling to the rock beach below, Mr. Kibblewhite received injuries from which he shortly atterwards expired, and Miss Lewis sustained a fractured thigh and bruises all down her right side.

It was in this plight they were found by Mr. Mervyn Morgan and Mr. Ernest John, uncle of Kibblewhite, two of a search party who had gone out to hunt for the couple when it was found they had not returned to their homes. An alarm was raised at midnight, and as Mr. Kibblewhite and Miss Lewis had been seen going towards the beach, the search party at once made in that direction. It was three o'clock in the morning when they came across the young man and woman, and with all speed had them removed from the beach, Miss Lewis being taken to West Farm, in the occupation of Mr. T. Jenkins, her

uncle, where she had been staying.

Mr. A. W. Wright, the leader of the Llantwit ringers, who sends these particulars, adds: "I am sending you the particulars of a sad death which befell one of my ringers here. He was one of two young men that started to ring nine months ago, and had made great strides in the Art, and had he lived no doubt he would have made a name in the ringing world. He had only been a member of the Llandaff Diocesan Association for three months. He was beloved by all who knew him, and was carried to his last resting place by his brother-ringers, who sent as a tribute a large floral bell. On Sunday, April 10th, the bells were rung half muffied as a mark of respect. I am sending you a photo of the grave, which is as near to the church tower as is possible, and am also enclosing the report from The Glamorgan Gazette. No doubt you have heard of the sad affair. The young lady is still alive, but there is not much hope of her getting better."

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

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
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
