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AN OBJECTIVE FOR THE NEW YEAR

To all ringers everywhere 'The Ringing World' once again extends hearty wishes for a happy and prosperous new year. It is an old wish which, by reason of its age, has to some extent become a convention, but surely there never was a time when it was uttered on all sides with greater sincerity than it is to-day. For some time past the nation, indeed all the world, has been looking from beneath the clouds of depression towards the coming of brighter days, which seem just beyond the horizon, but whose advent is so long deferred that it is not surprising that many who are suffering are in the grip of despair. The hope is in every breast that the new year will bring with it a new tide of prosperity and that from this dear old country of ours the grim spectre of unemployment will be banished. In many quarters its presence is having an adverse effect even on ringing; meetings are suffering because men cannot afford to attend them; associations are finding it a little difficult to get in a certain proportion of their subscriptions because men who are without work cannot afford even this small sum from their straitened means.

In spite, however, of the difficulties of the times, there is no need for pessimism over the outlook for ringing. The art is more than holding its own in face of many handicaps. But if there is one thing more than another to which attention might be devoted in the coming year it is in the direction of creating a greater interest in the work of the ringing organisations. Unless a ringer can take the wider view of his work and all that appertains to it he loses a good deal of the interest and inspiration that is to be gained from an active share in and an appreciation of what is being done by the county and diocesan associations and guilds. Parochialism in ringing is as stifling as parochialism in any other department of church or civic life. The limitation of activity and interest when a ringer is concerned only with what goes on in his own tower can never lead to real progress; indeed, this confined outlook will almost inevitably result in evaporation of any initial interest there may have been and a growing indifference to the real objective of church bell ringing. There are greater ideals and possibilities to be achieved from sharing in the work and forwarding the objects of an association; the wider view and activities of a diocesan or territorial organisation are much more interesting than those of the individual tower, and more stimulating; just as a wide panorama is better worth looking at and more inspiring than a courtyard. During the coming year, then, let the efforts of all who have the welfare of ringing at heart be bent to awakening in the indifferent an interest

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in the work of the association in whose area they live. Thus will they foster the true welfare of the art and help to create a real incentive to progress in the best sense of the term.

A LEICESTERSHIRE RESTORATION.
TREBLE BELL ADDED AT BILLEDSON.
 Possessing but five bells for twenty years, the Parish Church of Billesdon has been able to boast of an enthusiastic band to ring them. Although the 'go' was anything but good, the company manfully stuck to it, and some nine or ten good ringers regularly 'pealed' them week by week. For a long time they agitated and worked for an extra bell, and at last their desires have been gratified. The old tenor is one of the few pre-Reformation bells left to us, and like all village bells its weight 'grewed.' Eventually it was reputed to be 16 cwt., but those interested will like to know that she is but 11 cwt. 3 qr. 4 lb. in F. Other bells were added in 1624, 1628, 1662, and the treble to make the five put in in 1912. A number of peals of Doubles have been rung on these five, including the longest by the Midland Counties Association—6,600 changes in 1926.

The five bells have now been retuned and a new treble added by Messrs. J. Taylor and Co., and all rehung in ball bearings on the old frame, with a new portion added to take the extra bell.

The service of dedication was conducted by the Ven. Archdeacon F. B. Macnutt, M.A., F.R.Hist.S., Provost of Leicester Cathedral, on Monday evening, December 19th. Immediately after the dedicatory prayers the new treble was pulled up, then all six bells rung in rounds while the clergy proceeded to the chancel.

The Archdeacon, in a powerful sermon, congratulated the Billesdon parishioners on their effort, and appealed to the congregation to make an effort to clear the debt balance of some £60. He quoted many historic facts from the late T. North's 'Church Bells of Leicestershire,' and also Morris' 'History and Art of Change Ringing.' He especially welcomed in the congregation the presence of the latter author, Mr. Ernest Morris, F.R.Hist.S., well known throughout the diocese for his keenness on all matters referring to bells, and a valuable consultant to the Bishop's Advisory Committee. He gave many personal reminiscences of bells and ringing, and especially he recalled his wedding day when, in leaving the church amid the excitement and ringing of bells, he left his top hat in the vestry.

After the service Bob Minor, Grandsire and Plain Doubles were rung by the local band and visitors from Hallaton, Leicester and Loughborough. Everyone concerned was pleased with the 'go' of the bells, and the new treble is a perfect splice to the rest. The louvres have been boarded up, and the sound immediately below outside the tower is much softened, while the carrying effect is greatly marked. Billesdon now has a fine ring of six, and we look forward to seeing abundant peals of Minor by the locals.

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BELFRY GOSSIP.

The Sussex County Association, one of the first to be organised on 'district' lines, has for over forty years comprised three divisions—East, Central and West. An increasing number of towers and greater activity has now led to a rearrangement, and from January 1st there are to be four divisions—East, West, North Central and South Central.

A peal of Stedman Triples rung at Erdington last week was the one thousandth peal by the St. Martin's Guild. Mr. G. F. Swann, who is the peal recorder of the Guild, supplies us with the following interesting particulars. Of the total number, 823 have been rung on church bells in 81 towers, and 177 on handbells, by 506 ringers. No fewer than 178 of the tower bell peals have been rung at St. Martin's Church, while 84 have been rung at Erdington.

There was a time when change ringing for Sunday services was not encouraged; in fact, in some quarters it seems to have been deprecated almost as much as prize ringing. In the issue of 'Church Bells' of January 10th, 1874, a 720 of Bob Minor was recorded as having been rung for evening service on Sunday, December 21st, 1873, at Belbroughton, Worcestershire. Appended to it was the following footnote by the editor: 'The next time the Belbroughton ringers go in for Bob Minor we hope they will not do it on Sunday, there being six days a week for work and pleasure.' We have progressed since then!

NEW GRANDSIRE CATERS RECORD.

SUCCESS OF THE APPLETON PEAL.

At Appleton, Berks, famous for many noted ringing performances, a new record for Grandsire Caters was set up on Tuesday, when a band of the Oxford Diocesan Guild were successful in ringing the peal of 16,271 changes in this method. The bells started into changes at 8.40 a.m., and 'This is all' was called at exactly six o'clock, the peal having thus occupied 9 hours and 20 mins.

Excellent ringing was heard in the peal, which was rung at an average rate of nearly 29 changes per minute, and the band were heartily congratulated upon the successful completion of their great effort. Among those who visited Appleton during the day to listen to the ringing were the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn, Master of the Oxford Guild, and Mr. A. E. Pegler, of Bangor, North Wales.

Many long peals have been rung at Appleton, including the greatest length ever achieved by one set of men, the 21,363 Stedman Caters on April 22nd, 1922, in which were three of the ringers who took part on Tuesday, Messrs. George Holifield, jun., Richard White and Frederick White.

The 16,271 Grandsire Caters supplants as a record length of Grandsire Caters the 15,227 rung at Cheltenham on April 22nd, 1889, in 9 hours 43 mins., which, in its turn, had beaten the 13,265 rung at Appleton on April 11th, 1888.

The congratulations of the Exercise will go out to the band of Tuesday last upon their successful performance, with which must be associated that Appleton veteran, Mr. George Holifield, sen., who composed the peal and who took part in most, in fact we believe all, of the previous long lengths rung in this tower.

THE ATTEMPT FOR LONDON SURPRISE RECORD.

FOUR HOURS' PERFECT RINGING, THEN—!

The attempt for the record length of London Surprise Major, the 14,144 composed by the late Rev. H. Law James, at Warnham, Sussex, on Monday, ended after four hours' ringing in a 'shift course.' There had been perfect striking, and 31 courses had been rung when the first serious trip occurred, and the bells 'turned over' before it was righted. This happened while the tenors were parted; in a few more courses they would have been together for the rest of the peal. The ringers were: Walter Charman 1, George Olliver 2, Kenneth Snelling 3, Jack M. Cripps 4, C. Ernest Smith 5, Nelson Elliott 6, Alfred J. Bull 7, Oliver Sippelts (conductor) 8.

A NEW RING OF TWELVE. HEAVIER PEAL FOR LEEDS PARISH CHURCH.

The bells of the Parish Church, of Leeds, Yorkshire, have been recast and rehung, and are to be dedicated tomorrow (Saturday).

According to the history of the church it would appear that in the early part of the eighteenth century the church had six bells; these were increased to eight in 1746, then to ten in 1798, and, when the new church was built in

form a handy light ring. The entire peal has been remodelled and hung with the most modern type of fittings in a massive iron and steel framework, which accommodates all the thirteen bells on one level.

The bell chamber windows have been treated with sound deadening material so as to reduce the sound of the bells in the immediate vicinity of the church. Five of the bells of the peal are utilised for the sounding of the Westminster quarters and hours, whilst to each of the thirteen bells are fitted two additional striking hammers which are operated by a carillon playing machine, which is automatically set into operation at certain hours by a connection with the clock movement. There is a further hammer fitted to each of the bells, so that the entire peal of thirteen bells may be operated by one person from an Ellacombe chiming apparatus.



LEEDS PARISH CHURCH.

1841, a peal of thirteen bells was installed, i.e., a ring of twelve, with tenor approximately 35 cwt., and an additional semi-tone bell between the treble and 2nd so as to form a light ring of eight.

The going order of the bells had been very unsatisfactory for some years, until in February, 1931, the 8th bell collapsed in its bell pit owing to a breakage of one of its gudgeons. The question of restoring the peal was then taken in hand. It was eventually decided to entrust the work to Messrs. John Taylor and Co., Loughborough, who have recast the thirteen bells and added sufficient new bell metal to form a peal of twelve in the diatonic scale in the key of C natural, but the semi-tone bell is now between the 6th and 7th bells of the peal, i.e., commonly known as 'a flat 6th,' which produces another diatonic scale of eight in the key of F natural. The tenor bell of the peal of twelve weighs approximately 42½ cwt., and the tenor bell of the peal of eight weighs approximately 17 cwt. This latter will

DEATH OF MR. ALBERT E. PARSONS.

FORMER MASTER OF THE WORCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION.
We deeply regret to record the death of Mr. Albert E. Parsons, of Old Hill, Staffs, who passed away at the age of 67 years, on December 23rd.

Mr. Parsons' chief ringing interests were centred in the Worcestershire Association, which he had served in many capacities, having been one of its representatives on the Central Council and Master for nine years from 1912. In 1921 he was elected a vice-president of the association. He was also actively identified with St. Martin's Guild, Birmingham, and was frequently one of the speakers at the Johnson Commemoration Dinner.

When Worcester Cathedral bells were recast in 1928, Mr. Parsons made himself responsible for collecting the subscriptions for the 8th bell, which was recast by the Worcestershire Association. He was also treasurer of the association's War Memorial Fund.

He joined the association in 1888 and rang his first peal under its auspices in January, 1889. Altogether he had rung 94 peals, of which he had conducted 21, for the Worcestershire Association, his total peals being about 120. During the period 1890-1900 he was associated with the then famous Kidderminster band which, under Mr. Richard Matthews' conductorship, was doing much ringing in the higher methods. In recent years his peal ringing had been much curtailed, but in 1930 he took part in a peal of Stedman Triples by post and present officers of the association.

Mr. Parsons had been in ill-health for a considerable time, and his death brings a great loss to the association, among whose members he was held in the highest esteem and respect. The sympathy of a large circle of friends will go out to the widow.

The funeral took place on Tuesday at Halesowen Church. A peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus, which was to have been attempted at St. Martin's, Birmingham, on that day, was postponed on account of his death.

The Leeds peal is the sixteenth entirely new or recast ring of twelve bells to have been installed during the past sixty years, and of this number twelve of them have been cast at the Loughborough Foundry.

It is interesting to note from the inscription on the half-tone bell that Leeds was the first tower in which a ring of twelve was supplemented by a thirteenth bell.

DURHAM AND NEWCASTLE DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

A VICAR'S EXAMPLE.

A most successful meeting of the Eastern District of the Durham and Newcastle Diocesan Association took place at Sunderland on Saturday, December 17th, ringers being present from London, Middlesbrough, Newcastle, Whickham, South Shields, Chester-le-Street, West Hartlepool and the local band. Ringing first took place at Holy Trinity Church, and afterwards a substantial tea was served at St. Ignatius' Institute.

A short meeting was held immediately after, Mr. R. L. Patterson, vice-president, being in the chair, supported by the Rev. P. N. W. Strong.

The loyal toast was honoured, and the chairman made a sympathetic reference to the death of the late president, Mr. E. Ferry, the members standing in silence for a few moments as a mark of respect.

The vice-president welcomed Mr. Thomas, of London, and Mr. T. Metcalfe, secretary of the Cleveland and North Yorkshire Association, and also ringers from the outlying districts, and said what a great pleasure it was to the officials when they were supported by members of other districts. Their presence was greatly appreciated. He went on to say that their Vicar was a good friend to his ringers. He often visited the belfry and offered a short prayer before they commenced ringing. He would like to see that happen in all belfries.

Mr. Metcalfe proposed a vote of thanks to the clergy for the use of the bells, and went on to say how pleased he was with the vice-president's remarks with regard to the Vicar and his ringers. He hoped the day would come when that procedure was a general rule. —The Vicar, in reply, thanked the ringers for their welcome, and said, although he knew nothing about ringing, he admired the ringers for their devotion to their art and their great service to the Church. He had noticed that the ringers were certainly no strangers to each other, and he thought this was a great testimony to the ringing associations. He hoped the ringers would come again soon to Sunderland, where a welcome would always await them.

A vote of thanks to the ladies for the splendid tea was carried with acclamation.

The next meeting will be held at West Hartlepool on Saturday, February 11th.

Ringing afterwards took place at St. Ignatius' Church, the methods rung being Stedman Triples, Oxford Treble Bob, Double Norwich and Cambridge Surprise Major.

THE LATE MR. HERBERT HAIGH. MEMORIAL DEDICATED AT ORDSALL.

The memory of the late Mr. Herbert Haigh, of Worksop, who was one of the founders of the North Notts Association in 1886, and had served the association in various capacities from that time until his death, in January, 1932, has been tangibly perpetuated by the setting up of a library in the tower of All Hallows' Church, Ordsall, in which place he was born in 1866. For many years Mr. Haigh was one of the mainstays of the association, and for sixteen years from 1912 served it as hon. secretary. He was a member of the committee from the foundation of the association, and at the time of his death was hon. treasurer. He also represented the association on the Central Council.

After his death the whole of Mr. Haigh's ringing books and papers were placed by the family in the care of the Rector of Ordsall, and these form the nucleus of the library. The brass tablet bears the inscription:—

North Notts Association of Change Ringers. Founded 1887.

In memory of Herbert Haigh, who lies buried in this churchyard. Secretary, 1912-1929. Treasurer, 1912-1931. Member of the Committee 1887-1931.

The oak base on which the memorial is placed is the gift of Mr. R. W. Stockdale, the present hon. secretary of the association.

MEMORIAL DEDICATED.

The dedication of the memorial took place at a largely attended meeting, and was performed by the Rev. A. Parkinsop, Rural Dean and Vicar of East Retford. The service was conducted by the Rector of Ordsall (Rev. R. F. Wilkinson). Members of the association were present from Retford, Worksop, Gainsborough, Anston, Barlborough, Creswell, Everton, East Markham, Edwinstowe, Gamston, Shirceaks and Sutton-on-Trent; Mr. William Haigh, brother of the late Mr. Haigh; Mrs. Hodson, Huddersfield (sister); Mrs. Haigh (niece); Mrs. Turner, Worksop (daughter); Mrs. Crawford and Mrs. Rowsell, Lancham; the Revs. R. E. Rogerson (East Markham), T. H. J. Eling (Sutton-on-Trent), and B. Hughes (curate of Ordsall), and the clergy taking part: Mr. P. P. Barlow (churchwarden) and Mr. H. M. Cafferata, Sutton-on-Trent.

The Rural Dean's text was, 'He was a good man' (Acts xi. 24), which words he associated with the late Mr. Haigh. After referring to the influence of bells on the lives of Christian people and their inspiration to poets, the preacher said: 'Though the music of the bells is sweet, the service of the bellringers is sweeter. I speak with all sincerity when I say how deeply I personally value all that you do in whatever tower you serve as bellringers. It is not for the parish priest that you render your service, but it is for the glory of God that you give your best. God rejoices in the skill that you bring to your great work. Bellringers learn the art of concentration in their ringing. Whilst your mental faculties are offered in the service of God, your service of devotion is also acceptable to Him. I thank you for all you do in your great work. Continue in the work you have undertaken, for the message of the bells is sweet and your service is sweeter.'

'I will close my message with a reference to Herbert Haigh, in whose memory we are gathered to-day. You knew him better than I did. He was one of the earliest to make my acquaintance when I came to East Retford. I was struck by his enthusiasm and by his devotion to the art of bellringing, and in the encouragement he gave to others. He not only delighted in giving service, but he was generous in the gifts he made. He has left a memory which by your own desire you have determined to mark in the church he loved. I hope that this association which he loved so much will continue to flourish. We are fortunate in the fact that the Rector of Ordsall has the skill and concentration of effort in the part he is taking in bellringing, and we look to him for leadership. I appreciate the energy with which many young fellows have taken up the work which Herbert Haigh has laid down. I have seen signs of the right type of young men offering themselves for service in towers in the town, and I hope that the example of the secretary and his assistant and of others will be followed in this respect.'

PIONEERS IN NORTH NOTTS.

After tea in the Parochial Hall, the Rector alluded to the devoted efforts of the late Mr. Haigh for the welfare of the Association, and to the tremendous amount of time he spent and the sacrifice he made in the early days of the association in conjunction with the late Mr. Charles Crawford and others in the North Notts area. Among the pioneers were the late Rev. H. T. Slodden, Vicar of Worksop, who was secretary from 1887 to 1895; and the late Rev. B. Darley, Vicar of Harthill, who was secretary from 1895 to 1912.

The Vicar took the chair at the business meeting, at which three new members were elected, viz., Horace Flox and Harry Newton, of All Saints', Pontefract, and Percy Strangward, of St. Giles', Pontefract.

A vote of thanks to the Vicar, Rev. A. Waring, M.A., was proposed by Mr. F. Cryer, and seconded by Mr. H. S. Morley. The Vicar, in responding, gave the ringers a most hearty welcome to Howden, and wished every success to the Yorkshire Association. He also extended his best wishes for Christmas and the new year to all the members.

It was decided to hold the annual district meeting in March at Gooles.

Further ringing took place afterwards on the very fine new peal of eight, which have recently been put into the tower by Messrs. J. Taylor and Co. to replace those destroyed in the disastrous fire. They were greatly admired by all.

KEIGHLEY'S RINGERS 100 YEARS AGO.

The quarterly meeting of the Western Division was held at Keighley on Saturday, December 17th. By kind permission of the Rector (Canon J. C. F. Hood) the fine peal of bells (tenor 17½ cwt.) by Gillett and Johnston was available, and about 30 members were present from Armley, Birstall, Batley, Burley, Bradford Cathedral, Calverley, Denholme, Drighlington, Guiseley, Haworth, Headingley, St. Michael's and St. Chad's, Leeds Parish Church, Pudsey, Queensbury, Skipton, Silsden and the local company. Various quotations, ranging from Minor to London Surprise, were practised. Tea was served in the schools, and at the business meeting which followed the vice-president (Mr. J. Cotterell) was in the chair.

The following new members were elected: Mr. Harry Homer (Rothwell), Mr. John Major (Falkirk), Mr. Alan Rushworth and Mr. Herbert Helliwell (Haworth).

It was decided to arrange the next meeting, if possible, in March at Ossett.

A vote of thanks to the Rector and churchwardens for the use of bells was accorded on the motion of Mr. P. J. Johnson, who made reference to the tablets in the tower, one recording a peal of Stedman Triples in the year 1836, composed by Chas. Mason, of Otley, and another a peal of Cambridge Surprise Major. Both were ultimately found to be false, but nevertheless they went to show that this ancient tower of Airedale possessed a capable band of change ringers even in those early days.

A vote of thanks to the local company and to the ladies for the laudable tea was proposed by Mr. J. Baxendale, seconded by Mr. G. Tifferington. A course of Treble Bob on handbells by Messrs. P. J. Johnson, J. Cotterell, W. Popplewell and W. Barton concluded the meeting. The tower was afterwards again visited for further ringing.

The Rev. T. H. J. Eling, Sutton-on-Trent, in supporting the remarks of Mr. Rogerson, acknowledged the assistance he had received from the late Mr. Herbert Haigh.

BARKBY BELLS RESTORED.**FALLACY OF 'CHEAP-JACK' WORK EMPHASISED.**

Those who visited Loughborough Bell Foundry on the occasion of the recent Ladies' Guild meeting had the unusual opportunity of seeing two rings of five bells standing side by side—one for Barnby, the other for Barkby. The latter were being returned and rehung after the short period of six years since a previous 're-hanging on the latest pattern roller bearings' by a local firm of engineers.

Barkby is a small village some two miles from Syston, Leicestershire (recently made famous for turkeys as well as plums!), and the Parish Church possessed bells from an early date. The present 3rd dates from 1570, the 5th is dated 1603, 2nd 1634, treble 1631, recast 1854, and the 4th 1803. After the above-mentioned 're-hanging' Mr. Ernest Morris, of Leicester, took a band to the church for a peal to add yet another tower to his Leicestershire 'collection.' He succeeded in ringing 5,040 Doubles on April 9th, 1927, and put the following note to the record: 'A stupendous task. The "go" was dreadful, and it was only the determination and pluck of the ringers that made the peal possible. Much time was spent in splicing ropes, etc., and I was too exhausted at conclusion of peal to verify inscriptions.'

Subsequent peal attempts by other visiting bands failed through bad 'go.' Eventually one of the bearings broke down, and thus in a short time the bells had to be overhauled by a competent firm. Messrs. J. Taylor and Co. were entrusted with the work, and the bells were dismantled and taken to Loughborough for tuning and re-hanging on ball bearings.

They were rededicated by Dr. Cyril Bardsley, Lord Bishop of Leicester, on Sunday evening, December 18th. Prior to the service the local company rang some 'rounds and call changes,' and after the service visitors from Billesdon, Thrusington, Syston and Leicester rang Stedman, Grandsire and Canterbury Doubles. The tenor weighs 13 cwt. 2 qr. 27 lb. in E, and Barkby bells can now be pealed with ease.

SUNDAY BELLS.*To the Editor.*

Dear Sir,—The stipulation of the Crown Lands Commissioners in a new residential area seems to have drawn attention once more to the question of bell noises. Propter hoc, there appears in 'Punch' an article entitled, 'The Bells; or Sunday Sounds,' wherein Mr. A. P. Herbert directs his pen against what he calls the 'bell world.' Mr. Herbert's entertaining banter clothes, as usual, a serious purpose, and his protest is, up to a point, reasonable.

He puts forward the old argument against the clanging of single bells early in the morning, and so far as I can gather this is his chief complaint. No one will deny that the chiming of a single bell for an inordinately long period is peculiarly irritating; nor can one deny that the simultaneous ringing of two adjacent peals of bells in different keys is anything but offensive to the ear.

Where Mr. Herbert is wrong, I think, is in assuming that ringers as a body approve of such practices. He says: 'They (the bell world) have never distinguished between the various categories of bells, of which a few were mentioned above. They assume that all the noises they make on Sunday are admirable and must be suffered by the people without a word of protest. Any kind of bell, however awful, may be rung at any hour on Sunday, however early.' Later he says: 'But any other kind of Sunday sound is anathema in the bell world. The laughter of children on the municipal swings; the sound of an organ, played competently in a cinema; the language of Shakespeare, the music of the world; the click of bowls and golf balls; the whispers of lovers, the music of bands in the parks; the friendly clink of glasses at the inns. . . . The bell world—the real bell world—have lumped them all together as bad sounds, as they have lumped all their bells together as good sounds.'

It is perhaps not generally understood that a band of ringers is rarely responsible for the chiming of single bells. Ringers themselves usually detest the single bell as heartily as the rest of mankind. Moreover, change ringers, as music makers of an established order, are jealous of their reputations, and eager to present their best to the public ear.

As to the extraordinary assertion that all other Sunday sounds are anathema to the bell world, it may be worth while to remark that the bell world probably holds a great number of people as sensitive to music and literature as the author of 'Tantivy Towers,' and most decidedly there are very few quite insensible to the friendly clink of glasses.

We have a right, I think, to ask for a definition of the 'bell world.'
