#### RUPERT RICHARDSON

This week the Exercise remembers with gratitude the life of Rupert Richardson, of Surfleet, who completed his work on this earth on Sunday morning. There are hundreds of ringers, apart from his kith and kin and those living in the daffodil village of Surfleet, who will thank God for the example of his life. His friends knew that the call could be expected any day, and Rupert also knew. A big man with a big heart is how Rupert will be remembered. His friendship was as firm as a rock and was extended with that open-hearted sincerity and generosity to all who would grasp it. He loved his fellow-men for the good in them; he apprised goodness as some people might cattle, and that was what made him one of nature's gentlemen.

The little Lincolnshire village of Surfleet has for 50 years or more been a name known throughout the Exercise. Its Vicar was the Rev. H. Law James, and during his incumbency Surfleet bells were augmented to 12, the village having the lightest ring of 12 in the country. His churchwarden for many years was Rupert Richardson, who upon his death succeeded him in the Mastership of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild. Rupert regarded his Mastership as a sacred trust; he travelled the county and was familiar with every tower and every band of ringers. For his association he rang 514 peals, the last being at Spalding on September 26th. The only eight-bell tower in the county in which he had not rung a peal was Burgh-le-Marsh, and he had hopes of selecting a band to ring there.

Rupert did not confine his work for the Exercise to his own Guild. He was a familiar figure at meetings of the Central Council, where it frequently fell to his lot to smooth out difficulties. Ringers invariably turned to him when faced with perplexities, and he brought to bear that shrewdness of worldly affairs coupled with a comprehension of ringing problems. He and his wife and daughter were members of the party that toured Australia. British ringing could have had no better representative, not only as a ringer, but in matters of bell hanging he had that knowledge capable of improvising in unexpected emergencies.

'The Ringing World' had in Rupert Richardson a very sincere friend. He realised the importance of the journal to the Exercise, and was ever ready with practical advice to help forward its great work in cementing together ringers into one great brotherhood. The founder-editor,

Mr. J. S. Goldsmith, was held by Rupert with very great affection, and upon his death he was one of the small body who negotiated for this journal to pass out of private ownership into the hands of the Central Council. On Thursday afternoon his friends from far and wide gathered at Surfleet to pay homage to one who gave so freely of his time and energies for the advancement of change ringing. To his widow and daughter, on behalf of the Exercise, we extend our deepest sympathy.

## UNIVERSITIES' ASSOCIATION RE-UNION

BISHOP OF LONDON AND THE CHURCH'S TASK ..... YOUNG RINGERS AND HOLY ORDERS .... DR. SPICE RESIGNS SECRETARYSHIP ..... THIRTY-SIX NEW MEMBERS

The third annual dinner of the Universities' Association was held in London on January Association was lead in London on January lst. During the day there was ringing at St. Mary's, Battersea. St. Mary Abbot's, St. Stephen's, Westminster, St. Mary's, Lambeth, and St. Gabriel's, Pimlico; one novelty was a course of spliced Double Norwich and Bristol (a production of the fertile brain of Mr. B. D. Price) at St. Stephen's, Westminster.

The service was held at St. Gabriel's, Pimlico, when the preacher was the Bishop of London (Dr. J. W. C. Wand).

The Bishop, in his address, said: In these days of trials and anxieties a great opportunity lies before the Church of God, and signs are not wanting that the mass of the people may be readier than is sometimes thought for a return to Christianity. It is, therefore, your duty, as church workers, to look forward to the Church's task, and to see how best to forward it. I am going to suggest three ways by which such an approach can be made.

The first of these is by way of conduct and morals. It is widely recognised that society as we know it is in danger of a break-up, and that we are perilously near to sliding into a state of neo-paganism. But men and women are beginning to see that whereas man cannot work out his own salvation God can and will help him, and that the way back to stable homes and a stable society can only come through Christianity.

Thus, during my recent visit to Germany, members of the Forces frequently asked me just what demands are made on the individual by Christianity. In the past it has often been said that doctrine and dogma were unnecessary adjuncts to the Gospel message; but whenever doctrine and dogma have been dispensed with then has Christianity tended to degenerate into a rather vague ethical system, and its force has been greatly weakened. So it is necessary for all professing Christians to be able to show just what the acceptance of Christian doctrine implies in our daily life—and this tack can be best approached by pointing out the collapse of moral standards.

Christianity must secondly be approached through faith. The truths of Christianity are unchanging, but these doctrines need to be explained afresh to each generation, that their significance may always be apprehended. There are thousands upon thousands of people in the country to-day who simply do not understand the language of religious truth or the stand the language of religious truth or the intergrical tradition of the English Church. For instance, when I was the Dean of an Oxford college, I was rather proud of a simplified beautiful service which we used to hold in chapel on Sunday evenings. One day I was pleased to see at the service an Abraham I and the service and the se what he thought of it (he was a Christian Scientist) and received the reply that he had be tensions between the demand from coutside the Church for simpler services the everyone can understand and the demount from those inside for richer and more beautiful services. For these reasons we must have body of people who can translate Christian doctrines and ideas into everyday language.

The third line of approach to Christianity is Christianity is life itself, and highest expression is in the adoration of our maker redeemer—that is to in the adoration our maker redeemer—that is to in the greatest popular heresy to-day is that Christianity is a land are nominally Christian, but only a very small proportion observe the obligations of Christianity. On the contrary, Christianity is the life of Christ imbued in the life of every member of the Church, which is the body of Christ. Christianity is intensely practical, as witness the importance given to the body in the marriage service. It is, therefore, essential to bring the people back to church. Once again we must be practical, and here I would urge the general acceptance of a bedrock rule such as the Archbishop of York has recently recommended-that all members of the Church should join in public worship at least once every Sunday. Such a rule should appeal especially to you, as you must feel particularly hurt when your invitation to come and worship

The secretary, Dr. J. E. Spice, proposed the toast of 'The Universities' Association,' first reading an apology for absence from Rev. A. C. G. Thurlow and a letter from Rev. M. Melville. He reviewed the year's activities and then the progress of the association since its formathe progress of the association since its forma-tion. Last year's ringing week had seen two innovations which he hoped would become institutions—namely, the holding during the week of a Corporate Communion and of an informal concert. The time had now come for him to resign the secretaryship, but he had no doubt that the association would go on from strength to strength.

Miss Cross proposed a toast to 'The Ringing She stressed the fact that the main work of the Universities' Association was in teaching and, more important, in teaching how to teach, and she thanked the visitors and the various ringing organisations they represented tor all they had done and were doing to help the association in various ways.

Mr. A. A. Hughes responded. He said that it was a pleasure for those ringers in London to do all they could to help. The Universities' Association was doing some very good work and the Exercise would reap the benefit in

the years to come.

Mr. F. E. Haynes, in proposing the toast to 'The Clergy,' spoke of the happy memories he had of his early associations with the clergy of the Cambridge University Guild. He was sorry so few young ringers were now entering the Church—only 20 per cent. of the C.U.G. were now in orders. The great thing was to increase the numbers of ringing clergy. He congratulated the secretary on his engagement and announced the engagement of two well-known members of the U.A.C.R.—Mr. C. W. Woolley and Miss M. D. Telford.

On entering this belfry it was found that there was no lighting in the ringing room, but with the Vicar's kind assistance two candles came to the rescue and ringing on this eight, tenor 12 cwt., was enjoyed by candle-light—a novel feature, with the ropes flashing grotesque shadows on the white walls.

A return was then made to Thornaby and more ringing enjoyed there until retiring to H.Q. for further festivities and handbell ringing. A very enjoyable day concluded with votes of thanks to the host-cum-organiser and hostess, and the 'Geordie' contingent departing on the long trek back home.


