



THE RINGING WORLD

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YORKSHIRE

News from Yorkshire predominates in this issue. Outstanding is the decision of Canon C. C. Marshall to resign the presidency of the Yorkshire Association, an office he has held with distinction since 1910. Next year Canon Marshall will have completed 50 years in the ministry, of which 40 years were spent as Vicar of St. Chad's, Far Headingley, Leeds. His resignation from both offices has been prematurely advanced by an unfortunate car accident last January. The Exercise re-echoes the sentiments of the general secretary, Mr. L. W. G. Morris, that a 'restful retirement will restore him to good health in the shortest possible time.' Since its foundation in 1875, the Yorkshire Association has had only three presidents. The first holder of the office was the late Jasper W. Snowden, whose great contributions to the art of ringing were, until the war intervened, commemorated by an annual dinner. So far it has not been possible to revive this function which brought ringers from all over the country to Yorkshire to pay homage to the memory of one of the giants of the Exercise. The next president was his brother William.

Ringling to-day in Yorkshire, as in most parts of the country, is progressive. The Association made last year 156 new members, and has now a record total of 1,357. The annual report indicates that in most towers there is no dearth of ringers, some having sufficient for two companies. Mentioned in the report is the young band at Whiston, near Rotherham, and it is a pleasure to feature in this issue as our illustration a photograph of these boys. We trust that, encouraged by their good start, the company will keep together and advance. Peal ringing in Yorkshire during 1946 was again satisfactory, with 96 on tower bells and one in hand. There were 36 members who rang their first peal and 167 instances of members who rang their first peal in one particular method. That nearly one-fifth of the members have taken part in the peals spread over 65 churches indicates that peal ringing still has a wide appeal, which the report suggests is a healthy sign.

The variety of Surprise methods is a feature of the peal analysis, and Aldenham Surprise Major appears for the first time. In other parts of the country ringers will be surprised to note that the peal of Oxford Bob Triples is recorded as the first by the Association. This, comments the report, is a very old method and one which is widely practised in some parts of the county, but Triples have never been as popular as Major in Yorkshire, which is,

perhaps, the explanation why Oxford Triples has not appeared in the Association's records before. The year has seen first peals having been scored on the bells at Middleham, Bedale and Sprotborough, and on the present bells at Doncaster and Bawtry. Three towers appeared again after long absences—Kildwick after 18 years, Wetherby after 24 years, and Fishlake, where the only other peal on the bells was rung in 1910. Thus from the broad acres of Yorkshire is told the story of vigorous and enthusiastic ringing in many centres. The zenith of Yorkshire ringing has not yet been reached, and if proper attention to attracting young people to the belfry is fully encouraged, the present membership could be substantially enlarged.

Mr. Ernest J. Padgett, of Barnby Don, rang the most peals for the Yorkshire Association in 1946 with 24 to his credit. He rang his first peal as recently as May, 1945.

The band at Henfield congratulate Miss Stella Wickens on ringing the treble so faultlessly to the peal of Double Norwich. They would also like to thank Mr. Cruttenden, the local captain, for providing the excellent tea afterwards.

The peal at Cheriton, Kent, on May 10th, was rung by the ringers of 'Ye Olde Cinque Ports' and commemorated the presentation of the Medaille Militaire to Mr. Winston Churchill by the French Government on that day.

Good wishes are extended to Mr. Norman Chaddock, of Broom, Rotherham, who will be entering Peterborough Teachers' Training College in June. We have a number of ringers in Training Colleges; it is surprising that Mr. P. Cannon has not assembled six or eight of them together for a peal.

Our suggestion that Mr. Trollope's book, 'The College Youths,' should be in Guild libraries has brought forth a letter from Mr. A. C. Hazelden stating that the manuscript of the book is stored in the library of the Guildford Guild. The library has also an unpublished manuscript of his 'London Ringers of the 17th and 18th centuries.'

BELFRY GOSSIP

Apart from the footnote published in our peals column, the peal at Truro Cathedral had several points of interest. It was the 60th peal together of the Rev. and Mrs. A. S. In this issue we record the dedication of the bells of Carlton-juxta-Snaith, Yorkshire. The first peal on the bells was rung on May 17th.

The three Beresford children who recently rang their first peal are appearing in the B.B.C. 'Midland Magazine' programme tomorrow (Saturday) at 5 p.m. They have made a record of Mavesyn Ridware bells to be used during the programme. Wavelength 296.2 m.

Latest applicant for the brochure for beginners issued by Mr. A. E. Sellers of the Beverley and District Society comes the Holy Trinity Bellringers' Association, Hobart, Tasmania. An active society has existed at Hobart for many years; their bells came from the Whitechapel Foundry in 1846.

Mr. E. Bishop, sen., now in his 83rd year, rang the 23½ cwt. tenor at Rotherfield, Sussex, to 1,260 Stedman Triples on May 4th, when Bishop Horden dedicated the new side chapel. Canon Marshall Retires

With very real regret and sorrow, the Yorkshire Association at their annual meeting at St. Chad's, Far Headingley, Leeds, received the resignation of their president, Canon C. C. Marshall, M.A., due to the effects of injuries sustained in a motor-car accident last January. For the same reason he recently resigned the living of St. Chad's.

The decision was first announced to a special meeting of the committee, and Canon Marshall suggested as a possible successor the Rev. C. O. Ellison, who possessed great qualities and was keenly interested in the art.

Mr. L. W. G. Morris (general secretary), after expressing regret at hearing the president's decision, hoped that a restful retirement would restore Canon Marshall to good health. He supported the president's nominee as successor.

Mr. P. J. Johnson recalled that Canon Marshall had held office since 1910 and was regarded by them all as a very old friend. He assured the Canon of their kindest thoughts and said no doubt steps would be taken to place on record their great appreciation of his work.

Mr. W. Barton (peal secretary) spoke of a keen personal loss and said the Canon combined the qualities of friendship with the office of president.

Thanking the speakers for their kind references, Canon Marshall said it was a very sad day for him. Throughout his tenure of office he enjoyed the friendship and loyalty of his fellow officers and the rank and file.

A resolution that a sub-committee should interview the Rev. C. O. Ellison, of Wetherby, to discuss with him the matter of his accepting office as president and to report back to the next meeting was later submitted to the general meeting and carried.

'HARD WORK AND LOYALTY.'

A brief service took place at 4 p.m., at which Canon Marshall in a farewell address drew attention to words which would be found in the annual report—'hard work and loyalty.' That, he said, had been the watchword underlying the growth and development of the Association from its earliest days to its present greatness. Without it no association could succeed, and the responsibility for this hard work and loyalty is one which rests with each individual member.

After a splendid tea, Canon Marshall presided at the general meeting, supported by the general secretary, the hon. treasurer (Mr. S. F. Palmer) and the hon. peal secretary.

The annual report recorded another successful year, during which 156 new members, a record, were elected, and the membership now stood at 1,357, also a record. A substantial part of the new members were from the Northern District, which reflected great credit on the district secretary, Mr. E. Hudson, and his fellow officers.

The peal secretary's report showed that 96 peals had been rung on tower bells and one on handbells at 65 churches and one handbell centre. The calling had been shared by 32 conductors and 36 members had rung their first peal.—An increased balance, which stood at £418 10s. 1d., was shown on the balance sheets.

Mr. P. Birkett moved and Mr. W. Critchley seconded the adoption of the report, which was carried with applause.

A vote of thanks to the treasurer and hon. auditors, who gave a brief report, was carried on the motion of Mr. S. Briggs, seconded by Mr. J. W. Moxon.

Acknowledging his re-election as peal secretary, Mr. W. Barton pointed out the importance of conductors seeing that the subscription of members elected in the tower were paid at the time, as much extra work was inevitably caused in tracing such members at the end of the year.

Mr. L. W. G. Morris was re-elected general secretary for a further period of three years. In thanking the members, he said that he had now held office for nine years and was a believer in official posts going round more. He had derived much pleasure in doing what he could and spoke of the team spirit that existed generally throughout the Association—a cardinal factor underlying its success.

The next general meeting was fixed for September 20th at Barnsley.

Considerable discussion took place on a motion of the General Committee 'that the committee shall have power to consider applications and make grants from the Bell Repair Fund up to a maximum of £5 in approved cases, always provided that such grant or grants do not when made reduce the balance of the fund below £20.'

Mr. E. Hudson moved and Mr. J. W. Moxon seconded the recommendation. An amendment, moved by the President and seconded by Mr. W. Barton, that no action be taken and the matter be referred back to the committee for further consideration, was carried. New members elected were R. Towler (St. Chad's) and Mary Shearsmith (Pudsey).

Mr. P. J. Johnson reported that he had made enquiries in the matter of the Snowden Dinner, but regretted that up to the present he had not found anything satisfactory at Leeds.

The usual votes of thanks included a special one to the local company and Mr. H. R. Parkinson in particular for their excellent arrangements. Replying to a vote of thanks to the chairman, Canon Marshall referred to the many kindnesses, happy memories and immutable friendships he had made during his tenure of office.

Ringing was comprehensive in character, extending from Bob Major to Superlative and Yorkshire Surprise.

OBITUARY

MR. FRED BARBER.

The Wellingborough Branch of the Peterborough Diocesan Guild has lost their strongest and most hard working supporter by the death of Mr. Fred Barber, of Doddington Ridge. He died rather suddenly at his home on May 16th, aged 74 years.

Born at Wilby, Mr. Barber, who was in the choir of St. Mary's Church for over 50 years, was also attached to Wellingborough band of ringers for many years. He left Wellingborough to live at Mablethorpe in 1934, but had to return to the district owing to the war. From July, 1921, to January 19th, 1935, Mr. Barber was branch secretary of the Guild, where he did most valuable work and was esteemed by all who knew him. His last act for the branch was organising a free tea for the last quarterly meeting of the district.

The funeral took place at Wilby on May 19th. The branch president, the Rev. W. R. Flex, assisted the Rector at the service, and a course of Grandire Triples was rung on handbells at the graveside by four members of the Irthlingborough band. The bells of the Parish Churches of Wellingborough, Wilby, Great Doddington and Earls Barton were afterwards rung half-muffled. Members present at the service were the Rev. W. R. Leicester Diocesan Guild

A PROGRESSIVE YEAR.

A progressive year with 174 new members, making a total membership of 743, was reported by the general secretary (Mr. H. W. Perkins) at the annual meeting of Leicester Diocesan Guild, held on May 3rd.

The Lord Bishop of Leicester presided, supported by the president (Mr. H. J. Poole), the vice-president (Mr. E. Morris), the general secretary and the treasurer (Mr. A. E. Rowley). In a word of welcome to the company—there were 160 sat down to tea arranged by Mrs. H. J. Poole and helpers—the Bishop said how pleased he was to see such a large gathering from all parts of the diocese. He hoped the Guild would continue to progress.

Other points mentioned by the secretary were that 16 new towers had affiliated and the number of towers with members in the Guild was 91.

The peal secretary (Mr. E. Morris) said that 95 peals had been rung, 64 on tower bells and 31 on handbells, ranging from 5 to 12 bells. All the standard methods of Major were rung, and two new methods—Bognor and Syston Delight—were scored. Much progress had been made in all districts.

The general officers were re-elected en bloc, and Market Harborough was chosen for the next meeting on July 19th.

The President reminded the members of the Guild Festival, to be held on October 25th. The De Montfort Hall had been booked for that date and he asked for the fullest support from every member of the Guild. The election of 36 new members was confirmed.

The Bishop, in closing the meeting, congratulated the general and district officers on the excellent work they had done. A social evening followed, which included handbell ringing with a course of Stedman Cinques and three leads of Spliced Kent Treble Bob and Cambridge Surprise Royal.

Some excellent tune ringing was rendered by ten members of the Guild under the leadership of Mr. S. Harrison. The members very much enjoyed a bit of nonsense by five members of the Guild, which was a ringer's version of 'Ignorance is Bliss.'

Much fun was also derived from a quiz on ringing. The evening concluded with a dance.

Earlier in the day there was ringing at the Cathedral, St. Margaret's, St. John's and All Saints'. The Guild service was held at St. George's Church, the address being given by the Bishop of Leicester, and the service conducted by the Vicar (the Rev. J. Adams). Mr. H. J. Poole read the lesson.

A New Yorkshire Six

CARLTON BELLS DEDICATED.

An interesting and historical event was celebrated on May 10th, when a new ring of six bells was opened at Carlton, near Snaith, Yorkshire.

When the war-time ban on bellringing was lifted it was discovered that three centuries of use had left the three bells, then hanging in the tower, badly worn and damaged and hanging so dangerously that even climbing had to be stopped. The three ancient bells have been recast in facsimile and rehung as an act of thanksgiving, as expressed in the service of rededication.

Three new bells, at the treble end, have been added to complete the ring of six bells. These bells have been given by Dr. J. B. and Mrs. McGranahan, in memory of their two sons and all other men of the parish who gave their lives in the last war.

The tenor bell (weighing 6 cwt.), upon which the hours are struck, bears the date 1623 and the prayer, 'Fili dei miserere mei' (Son of God, have mercy upon me). The fifth bell, also dated 1623, bears the inscription of 'Glory to God: Soli deo Gloria.' The fourth bell is inscribed, 'Jesus be our speed, 1652.'

The new bells are inscribed: Bell No. 3, upon the collar 'Dona eis requiem.' Upon the waist, 'Ad glor, die et in mem. Charles Cromack, Albert Dunn, Henry Brian Hague, Robert Pierson, Roy Richardson.' Bell No. 2, upon the collar 'Quis Separabit.' Upon the waist, 'Ad glor, die et in mem. James Michael McGranahan.' Treble bell, upon the collar, 'In morte non divisi.' Upon the waist, 'Ad glor, die et in mem. Hugh Benson McGranahan.' The regimental crest of the London Irish Rifles is embossed on the second bell and that of the Northants Yeomanry on the treble. Above the soundbow of each bell is inscribed, 'The gift of J. B. and L. O. McG. 1946.'

The work of recasting and providing the bells has been excellently carried out by Messrs. John Taylor and Co., Loughborough.

Carlton Parish Church was filled to capacity for the service of dedication of the three new bells and rededication of the three old bells, together with a memorial tablet, the Archdeacon of Doncaster officiating.

Following the dedication, ringers from Carlton, H. Longbottom, Margaret Graves, R. Coggan, W. Longbottom, E. Smith, and Joyce Huby (tenor), rang call changes. At the end of the service two teams from Carlton, consisting of Margaret Graves, Jean Turton, W. Graves, Joyce Huby, S. Watson and F. Sykes (tenor), and H. Longbottom, Jean Turton, W. Graves, W. Longbottom, G. Graves and E. Smith (tenor), also rang call changes, following which the first 720 changes of Kent Treble Bob Minor were rung by G. Waud (Goole), C. Hill (Goole), J. Waud (Goole), W. A. Hudson (Hemingbrough), J. Taylor (Eastrington) and L. M. Woodhead (conductor) (Goole). Ringers were also present from the Abbey Church, Selby, Hull, Thorne, Pishiake, and Mr. J. P. Fidler and Mr. Fidler (Loughborough), representing Messrs. Taylor and Co.

The Carlton teams only commenced to learn the handling of a bell in October last, under the tuition of Goole ringers. There is no doubt that an excellent light peal of six bells has been added to the Yorkshire Association (Selby District), and great credit is due to the Rev. E. H. Lawson-Brewis, Vicar, for his painstaking efforts in the organisation of a very successful and enjoyable event. L.M.W.
