A LANCASHIRE HOTPOT

LANCASHIRE folk claim to have gifts of unusual perception and anticipation, giving them mental faculties in advance of the nation. This column is not the appropriate place for justifying 'what Lancashire thinks to-day . . .,' but we would say that the Lancashire Association has been of great service to the Exercise in the publication of their fifth edition of 'Instructions and Diagrams for Beginners' at the modest figure of 1s. 6d. Text books on ringing are still inadequate in view of the large number of young people who have been attracted to our art.

To meet the deficiency the president of the Association, the Rev. F. F. Rigby, has published since the war 'Elementary Change Ringing,' and the Snowdon Series has had a revised edition of 'Grandsire,' largely the work of the late Mr. J. A. Trollope. There have also been the two valuable Surprise books from Mr. J. A. Corrigan, the late J. W. Parker's treatise on Stedman Triples, and Mr. Edgar C. Shepherd's 'Double Norwich Court Bob Caters.' The Rev. E. S. Powell's lamented death robbed the Exercise of one who had the gift of explaining the intricacies of ringing; his 'Ringers' Handbook' holds an honoured place among the bibliography of our art, and shortly before his passing he produced a revised and corrected edition of his handbook. The Central Council are not unmindful of its position, and they have in hand a book on Minor methods which should be available shortly, and also a book on handbell ringing.

While the handbook of the Lancashire Association embraces in its title the word 'for beginners,' its coverage goes as far as the principal Surprise methods, and the ringer who has mastered its contents could confidently regard himself as an accomplished exponent of the art. What is also of great value is the large number of touches and peals introduced. Many, it is true, are old favourites, but it is very handy to have them at hand. There is something to meet the ordinary occasions of ringing.

During the war the old type of this book was melted down and in consequence the work has been reset. There have been additions in accordance with the trend of events. Two new Plain Minor methods—Hereward Bob and Childwall Bob—have been added. Of the Surprise Minor methods only Cambridge and London are retained from the old edition, and in place of those omitted Wells, Surfleet, Beverley, Durham and York are introduced. Due recognition is also made of the Rev. E. Bankes James' arrangement of 5,040 Cambridge Minor. Other innovations are Erin Triples, Little Bob Major and Gainsborough Little Bob Major, and notes on conducting and handbell ringing, for which the Association thanks Dr. J. E. Spice.

To the sub-committee responsible—the Rev. F. F. Rigby, A. Tomlinson, G. R. Newton and P. Crook—a word of appreciation is due. The proofing of such a work is no light undertaking. While primarily for the Lancashire Association, the sale of the book is in no sense restricted to members. It is priced as low as 1s. 6d., which, in the words of one of the sub-committee, will not enable the officials of the Lancashire Association to retire on their profits from the publishing world! The desire is to help the Exercise. Thank you, Lancashire, for a fine piece of work!

Master George W. Pipe (13) has started his peals of the Stedman family with one of Cinques at Ipswich.

The bells of St. James', Devizes, will be broadcast for a few minutes before the 9.30 a.m. service on October 10th.

The average age of the band which rang the peal of Minor in five methods at Great Addington, Northants, was 19 years 1 month.

Congratulations to Mr. Percival H. Hull on five first peals at Westbury-sub-Mendip, Somerset. We hope it will not stop at Grand-sire Doubles.

Wonersh, Surrey, bells will be dedicated next Sunday immediately preceding the Sung Eucharist at 11 a.m. Ringing will take place after the service.

Standing Committee of Norwich Diocesan Association are to discuss an amendment to rules imposing a peal booking fee of 6d. on each ringer taking part in a peal for the Association.

A ringing pupil of Mr. Harold J. Poole, Harry Poyner, composed the method, Stanton Surprise, which appeared on page 386. The peal composition was found to be the same as John Reeves discovered years ago.

At the R.A.F. Station Church of St. Michael and All-ANGE's, Hereford, on Battle of Britain Sunday, Queen's and call changes were rung for morning service by B. W. A. Laker (Littlehampton) 1-2, A. W. F. Scarlett (Cheltenham) 3-4, F. S. Worth (Plymouth) 5-6.

Another notable absentee from the peal columns for some months is the well-known North Kent ringer, Mr. E. A. Barnett, who was ordered a complete rest by his doctor in May and is at present in hospital at Lenham, near Maidstone, where he is making satisfactory progress.

With reference to the death of Mr. Harry Chapman, who did so much good work for the Lancashire Association, a correspondent states he rang in all 495 peals (5 handbells, conducting 63). Of these 369 were for the Lancashire Association and the rest among 26 different associations and guilds. He rang peals in no fewer than 150 towers.

On December 5th last we commented on the four method peal of Spliced Surprise at Bantstead for Princess Elizabeth's wedding, and asked, 'Is there another tower in the country whose local hand could ring this peal?' The answer is 'Yes.' The Sunday service band at St. Martin's and All Saints', Oxford, have rung a peal in eight spliced Surprise methods.

In appreciation of his services as ringer, secretary and captain for many years at St. Lawrence's, Hawkhurst, Kent, Mr. W. G. Gorrings was presented on September 19th by Mrs. F. Butler, on behalf of the local band, with a combined peal and tower record book, the flyleaf of which was inscribed with an appreciation of his services and the names of subscribers. The same evening a gift was made to the tower of a peal book by Miss Louisa M. Kemp and a quarter-peal book to Mr. A. H. Kemp. All three books were of the 'Delight Major' series, supplied by Mr. W. Viggers.

twelve-year-old protégé of Mr. Frank C. W. Knight, who participated in the recent tour in Kent. John started to handle a bell in September, 1947, at the Church of the Annunciation, Chislehurst, with a group of boys, none of whom had entered a belfry before. Despite the handicap of heavy bells, the band made good progress and are now ringing Grand-sire, Plain Bob and have started Treble Bob.

John has eight peals to his credit (3 Plain Bob Major, 3 Grand-sire Triples and 2 Grand-sire Doubles), all rung on working bells. He has started conducting and called his first quarter on September 12th. John has mastered Double Norwich Court Bob Major and on ten bells can perform competently in Grand-sire and Stedman Caters and Bob Royal.

CHESTER DIOCESAN GUILD WIRRAL BRANCH.

Eleven Wirral towers were represented at the gathering of 57 ringers and friends at Neston Parish Church on September 18th. Touches of Surprise Major, Treble Bob and Plain Bob were successfully concluded, interspersed with rounds for beginners.

The service was conducted by the Rev. T. O. East (Vicar), and the company were guests of the Neston Parochial Church Council at tea.

Business included details of the social to be held on December 30th at St. Saviour's Parish Hall, Oxtou. Six young members were complimented on their peal at Bidston, and four honorary members elected. The vote of thanks to all who had helped to make the meeting a success was carried with acclamation.

GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL ASSN.

It is interesting to recall that over twenty years ago Mr. Yates generously gave two additional bells to King's Norton Church, making a ring of ten bells.

It is hoped the Cathedral twelve will be ready in good time for the customary Johnson Dinner early next year, when the many visitors on these occasions will be able to ring on this grand ring of bells. A.W.

WINCHESTER & PORTSMOUTH GUILD WINCHESTER DISTRICT.

OBITUARY

Canterbury District's Defence

Dear Sir,—Mr. W. Bottrill's study of the historical surveys of the great ringing associations has led him to form the opinion that the Canterbury District of Kent should be condemned, as the members are no longer capable of the duties which they have for so many years been trusted with.

As I have been a member of the district for about 48 years and am therefore one of the condemned, I should like to point out a spot which probably will be omitted from the study. The crack ringers mentioned applied for many of the district towers recently, and according to reports these were very kindly granted them for their use and pleasure—not one single penny was asked for steepleage—11 peals were scored, one peal lost. It must be outstanding to anyone that great care must have been given by someone in all those towers to help in the success achieved, and these were the Canterbury District men.

The question to me now arises, 'What of the future?' When applications are received and all our glamour boys are dumped as unfit for further service, who are we to look to for that great care of the bells?

Turning to the page where the black spots have appeared, I am afraid that no words of mine can alter the serious position that any man places himself in who chooses to abuse 200 ringers who are engaged in the sacred work of the church bells in 51 towers.

METHOD RECORDING BY MACHINE

Dear Sir,—It was interesting to read the letter by A. J. C. in a recent issue of 'The Ringing World' re Mr. Woodhouse's ringing machine and its versatility in printing diagrams of methods by pen attachment and I congratulate Mr. Woodhouse on its achievement, which reminds me of the ringing machine designed and made many years ago by the late John Carter, and later presented by him to the Science Museum, South Kensington, where it still is.

I remember this machine 40 years ago and saw it in operation many times. It was worked by a small electric motor which was driven by a small gas engine and my job was to attend to the engine, which at times gave a considerable amount of trouble, as many did in those days.

This machine, named 'The Campanamutophone,' was also adapted for printing diagrams of any desired method on a paper roll; it was also fitted with an attachment which printed the full figures of a method or the course-ends only as they were rung. 'Calls,' such as Bob or Single, were made by pressing a button at the correct moment, and I believe John Carter's machine was the first designed to do this work. A good description of this machine was printed in 'The Model Engineer,' March 5th, 1925; also another good description in Mr. Ernest Morris' 'History and Art of Ringing,' page 549.

I am not detracting in the least Mr. Woodhouse's wonderful machine, which many would like to see and hear, and I am hoping that facilities will be more readily available in the near future for demonstrations of these two ringing machines. ALBERT WALKER.

Mr. Albert E. Sellers reported on the August meeting at Bridlington, and forthcoming meetings announced were Middleton-on-the-Wolds, October 9th, and Market Weighton in November. Mr. Lister expressed the thanks of the meeting to the Vicar, organist and local ringers, and Mr. W. Goddard, on behalf of the last named, said they were always pleased to welcome the Society. Mr. and Mrs. H. Easter were elected members.

Ringing included courses of Double Norwich and St. Clement's Court Bob Major. All agreed that the meeting had been a happy reunion of Lincolnshire and Yorkshire ringers.

GEORGE PESTELL BURTON.
It is with regret we record the sudden death on September 21st of George Pestell Burton, at his home at Old Catton, near Norwich. Mr. Burton was 73 years of age, and for the greater part of his life was closely identified with ringing at St. Peter Mancroft, to which church he gave signal service.

It was solely by his efforts, during part of the time he was Master of Mancroft Guild, that the 13th bell was added, and he was the driving force in the heavy job of creating a new company when the Guild, the successor of the old Norwich Scholars, was started in 1907. In the same year he became hon. auditor to the Norwich Association, an office he continued to hold until his death, and from 1908 to 1920 was also one of the representatives to the Central Council. During these many years he gave valued help and advice to successive secretaries, who appreciated his sound judgment.

Although not a prolific peal ringer—his record for the Norwich Association was 54 on tower and handbells—he was skilful and safe in all he did. In early manhood he lived for a time at Burton-on-Trent, and there rang with the expert company at St. Paul's a good many peals in, at that time, the comparatively rare complex methods.

With his younger brother John and the late J. A. Trollope—all at school together—they started Minor ringing on a set of home-made handbells, and after scoring a 5,000, obtained the help of others of similar age. This band rapidly scored peals from Triples to Royal, including 11,200 of Bob Major, at that time the record length 'in hand.' This was perhaps the most enjoyable part of his ringing life, for either tower or handbells were going at all times of the day or night.

Mr. Burton was a keen churchman, and for some years had been warden at St. John's, Maddermarket, and was also a member of the Norfolk and Norwich Archaeological Society. It was his love for things of past days that prompted him to select, for larger business premises, an old Norwich posting inn. This was only the width of the street from the west face of the tower of Mancroft, and in its former days had seen performances of masques and plays by the old strolling players.

To his intimates he was known to be as steadfast as a rock, and one whose integrity was beyond question.

The funeral was at Old Catton Church on Friday last, and the sympathy of all old friends goes out to Mrs. Burton and their two sons. C.E.B.
