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## OURSELVES

IN our editorial of the issue of February 4th a concluding paragraph concerning the problems of publication aroused considerable interest, and the Editor acknowledges with gratitude the many helpful suggestions received. To most of these letters he has given a formal acknowledgment; will others who have not received a letter please accept his sincere thanks.

A concluding sentence in this editorial, in which a reference was made to 'lesser brethren who ring quarter-peals and those who enjoy their ringing at Saturday afternoon meetings,' has been in some quarters misinterpreted. In no sense does the Editor or the Exercise desire to disparage their service to ringing or the valued place they hold in the realms of change ringing. Their work is important; they knit together a spirit of friendship, and there is no question that the Saturday afternoon meeting has a stimulating influence for good, and is also an integral part in the organisation of ringing. The editorial of February 4th was intended as a brief survey of peal ringing in 1948, giving certain figures and facts which we felt were of interest, not only to peal ringers but to the Exercise as a whole. Because a man plays cricket on his village green on a Saturday afternoon it does not mean that he is not interested in county cricket. Peal performances are read and followed by a far greater circle than those who regularly participate. A non-ringing lady, who incidentally does not come from a ringing family, told the Editor that she always reads the peals and has an affectionate regard for certain men and women whom she has never seen. She has captured in her heart the same sense of enthusiasm as prevails in the sporting world.

A misapprehension exists regarding the paper allocation to 'The Ringing World.' Because daily and weekly newspapers now enjoy free sales this does not apply to the section of the press in the category of 'The Ringing World.' We receive an allocation in bulk. Last November we had our allowance increased, and it enabled us to dispense with the eight-page issues and to increase our circulation. The response for new readers was most satisfactory, and within a few weeks the Editor was happy to report to the Editorial Committee that the new peak figure had been reached. This week we have received from the Paper Controller our allocation figure for the next four months. This is a favourable figure. It will permit of another 300 new readers, and enable us to give an occasional 16-page issue for big events such as the forthcoming Central Council meeting at York and to keep abreast with the publication of peals.

We have two classes of subscribers—those on our mailing list and those who purchase their 'Ringing World' through the newsagent. Those on our mailing list are the most valuable, and it is to them that the solvency of 'The Ringing World' is due. From these subscribers 'The Ringing World' receives 3d. a copy, compared with a fraction over 1½d. from those who purchase through the newsagent, the reason being the cost of distribution through the publisher, the wholesaler and the newsagent. We do not ask these subscribers to transfer their allegiance; we welcome both sections of readers providing the mailing lists are maintained.

Now as to the procedure of new subscribers. If you desire to join our mailing list, send your subscription (4s. 3d. per quarter, 8s. 6d. half-year, or 17s. yearly) to Mrs. Fletcher, The White House, Caister-on-Sea, Great Yarmouth. In the event of a copy being lost in the post write to the Editor forthwith and he will attend to it at once. Please remember that 'The Ringing World' is only dispatched to those who have paid their subscriptions. Reminders are published at the appropriate time in black type. Last month there were some 80 subscribers whose copies were temporarily withheld pending the arrival of their subscriptions; they are drifting back into the fold, but with pegged circulations there was a danger of their journal being allocated elsewhere. So close have been our margins that the Editor has not a single copy left of the issue of February 4th.



As regards new readers who desire their copies through the news-agent the procedure is as follows: If your newsagent has any difficulty in supplying you, write to our publishers, Rolls House Publishing Company, Breams Buildings, London, E.C.4, giving the name of the newsagent and his wholesaler and the appropriate arrangements will be made. 'The Ringing World' is the connecting link joining all ringers into one big fraternity; its aim is to be the family newspaper of all who love ringing. The Editor is truly thankful for the support and interest he has received in the past. He has seen the circulation increase by 40 per cent. during his regime, and he is confident that with the goodwill existing to-day the new allocation of paper will be quickly absorbed.

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## In Appreciation MR. GEORGE WILLIAMS

It was a great shock and grief to me when I read in the 'Sunday Express' of January 30th that my old friend, George Williams, had passed away. My recollection of him goes back to 1894, when the Royal Cumberland Youths rang a peal of Grandsire Triples at Arundel, my birthplace. I was then only a beginner, and it was not until October, 1896, that he conducted my first peal, Grandsire Triples, at Fareham. Three of us, Chamberlain, Haggett and myself, went to Fareham on October 2nd, 1896, and after two hours of good ringing we were stopped by the church clock winder throwing stones at the belfry window, making it impossible for the ringing to be continued. A fortnight later, on October 16th, the three of us from Arundel again journeyed to Fareham for a second attempt, and this time there was no interference from the clock winder, and we three beginners scored our first peal of Grandsire Triples in 3 hours 1 minute, conducted by George Williams. This peal was the beginning of a life-long friendship, now severed by his passing at the ripe old age of 91. Most of the peals that I have rung were conducted by him, and in 1892 I migrated to Brighton and joined the St. Peter's band, where George Williams was the chief conductor.

Among other peals we rang together was the first 'George' peal of Stedman Triples, rung at Lewes on April 24th, 1893, and many firsts in new methods, Bristol, Norfolk, etc.

He (George Williams) also conducted the first peal of London Surprise rung in the City of London at St. Stephen's, Coleman Street, on January 14th, 1899, and of this peal there is very little doubt that Frank Bennett and myself are the sole survivors. Although I retired from active ringing in 1907, George never failed to look me up when he came to Brighton, as he often did, and now it is good-bye from his old friend.

GEORGE BAKER.

It was with the deepest regret I heard of the passing of my dear old friend, George Williams. I first met him on March 2nd, 1889, at St. Nicolas, Guildford, when he conducted my first peal, Grandsire Triples. That was the beginning of a friendship that has lasted within a month of 60 years. I met him again at East Meon on Whit Monday, 1891, when he called his 100th peal, Kent Treble Bob Major. He was a conductor of the highest ability, and for his weight a wonderful tenor ringer. I shall always remember the way he turned in Christchurch (Hants) tenor, 30 cwt., to Double Norwich on Boxing Day, 1892, and then in the evening rang St. Peter's, Bournemouth, to another peal of Double Norwich.

After my removal to Brighton we became almost inseparable and rang a large number of peals together, and I can honestly say we never had a disagreement. There were very few Saturdays that we were not out either to meetings or peal ringing, and mostly to oblige visitors, for at that time we used to get plenty of them, and George would always do his utmost to arrange something for them. It was a great loss to Sussex ringing when he left the county, and I did not see a great deal of him during my seven years in London, but since then we had had a good many enjoyable ringing weeks together. It was a great pleasure to us both when we rang our 1,500th peal together, although it was not pre-arranged. I was also in what was to be his last Double Norwich at Soberton in May, 1940, for his 82nd birthday.

Of his activities after he returned to his native county in 1905 I must leave others who were associated with him to record. His cheery smile will be sadly missed by us all and his place difficult to fill. May his soul rest in peace.

## LEARNT A METHOD LAST YEAR.

Dear Sir,—Although I only knew Mr. George Williams for five years, I would like to add my little tribute to the memory of a great man. Mention has already been made of the example he set to all ringers in his service to the Church, and to that I would simply add that of no one could it be more truly said that he was a Christian gentleman. One thing which always amazed me was his youthfulness and his buoyant spirit. Thus, last year I remember, when some 20 years his junior said they were too old to learn a new method, he learned and rang for the first time the No. 3 version of London Royal. Or, again, his peal books show that from October, 1938, to the end of 1939, when the war stopped peal ringing and when he was 81, he rang 25 peals in 17 different methods, including the only peal he ever conducted of Treble twelve, two of his four peals of Yorkshire Surprise Major, a peal of Stedman Cinques at the C.C. meeting, his only peal of Spliced 4, his only peal of Plain Bob Maximus (at St. Nicholas, Liverpool), and the second of his peals of Double Norwich Royal (the first being in 1902). Such facts speak for themselves.

Yes, the Exercise is the poorer for his passing. We have lost, in this life, a great man. May we all seek to follow his example of service.—Yours sincerely,

The meeting carried with acclamation a hearty vote of thanks to the Rector, the wardens, the local ringers and the organist for their part in a very successful meeting. The officers received sincere thanks for their efforts to promote interest during the year.

Further ringing was enjoyed on the bells until a late hour, the wants of all being catered for by the Master, Mr. T. Wilde.



## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

## REPORTING OF PEALS

Dear Sir,—Your leading article of Feb. 4th again draws attention to a fact that has been all too plain for some years—'The Ringing World' is quite unable to keep up-to-date with peal reports. This fact is well illustrated in this issue; there is not one report which should not have been printed previously, and some peals recorded were rung as long ago as January last.

The present style of reporting and size of type used have changed but little from those in use in the last century, when peals were comparatively few and paper was plentiful. Surely the remedy is obvious? I suggest that the traditional style should be drastically altered and the size of type greatly reduced. By doing this it should be possible to publish all peal reports which reach you on Monday in the following Friday's issue, and gain considerable space in the paper for other matter.

I do not doubt that many ringers would be sorry to see the old style abandoned; but we must realise that it is now out of date and just will not do. I would far rather see the reports up to date and all footnotes included in full.

While all relevant details must be included, such words as 'At the Church of' and 'A Peal of' could well be omitted; 'Composed by' and 'Conducted by' could be abbreviated, and the words 'Treble' and 'Tenor' could be replaced by numbers.

Of course, a reduction in the size of reports would produce an outcry from those who rely on your columns for the collection of performances, statistics, etc., particularly from those who confess to being unable to read 'Bob Major' unless preceded by the word 'Plain.' As a help to peal secretaries and others, I suggest that peals should be grouped under the Associations for which they are rung, the Association headings being arranged in alphabetical order. Further, the peals in each group could be arranged alphabetically according to the places at which they were rung. The name of the Association would then be omitted from individual reports.

By printing the place and method in heavy type, readers would be able to tell at a glance what had been rung and where. This is possible at present, but one needs to glance at five or six pages.

Handbell peals should still be kept apart; but with the system of grouping by Associations, I see no reason why peals on different numbers of bells should still be kept in separate sections. C. W. WOOLLEY.

## PEAL RINGING AND THE 'RINGING WORLD'

Dear Sir,—Last week's leading article comments on the heavy demand which peal reports make on the available space in 'The Ringing World.'

I sometimes wonder whether or not too much weight is given to peal ringing in ringing circles generally, tending to overshadow other ringing activity.

Undoubtedly, peal ringing has an immense value in giving an urge to greater achievements, and regular peal ringers are amongst the best strikers, and many of them key men in the Exercise.

However, many who are supporters of the established ringing organisations, and who are regular service ringers, probably skip the first few pages of 'The Ringing World,' or just look for peals of local interest, or the odd peal which they themselves occasionally take part in. These ringers would probably continue to take 'The Ringing World,' even if the space devoted to peals was considerably reduced and the space made available utilised for discussion, illustrations, varied articles

and news of activities other than peal ringing. Could a 'Peal Supplement' be published, say monthly or quarterly, for those who wished to have a copy, instead of the present system. Meritorious performances could still receive prompt publicity in the 'Gossip' column. This would release the equivalent of a page or two each week. After all, peals receive further publicity in the Association Reports and in 'The Ringing World' from time to time.

A good peal by a local band is a valuable achievement. A good peal by a band from various sources may be a valuable achievement, or just a piece of personal satisfaction. In the absence of local knowledge one cannot always tell from the peal columns.

In conclusion, may I emphasise that I am not decrying the value and pleasure of peal ringing. I think it should be the aim of every probationer to ring a good peal as early as possible, and that all those who are able should take some part in peal ringing activity to add polish to their capabilities.

It may, however, be worth while pausing to consider whether we have not become over-conscious of the merit of peal ringing for its own sake to the exclusion of other attributes of the average ringer.—Yours, etc.,

## ELECTRONIC BELLRINGING

Dear Sir,—The Central Council librarian has recently accepted from me a small collection of letters and photographs connected with an electronic bellringing apparatus which was made over thirteen years ago.

About 1935 Mr. L. E. A. Bourn, of the John Compton Organ Co., conducted experiments which led to the production of the modern Compton electric organs. Apparently as a sideline, he built a bellringing apparatus which was installed for a time at Albury (Surrey) and could be heard for twelve miles. This apparatus was notable in that it contained neither bells nor recordings, but produced the sound synthetically.

To condemn such an apparatus is useless; it represented a real advance in electronic progress. It seems that the danger of such an apparatus being manufactured to replace ringers passed while we were in happy ignorance, for the Compton organ has been produced whereas automatic ringing apparatus has not been.

I can thoroughly recommend to those interested a book recently published, 'Electronic Musical Instruments,' by S. K. Lewer (Pub. Electronic Engineering, 28, Essex Street, W.C.2). This book at 3s. 6d. is a mine of information collected from technical journals on sound synthesis, and contains sections on pitch standards. Thus on page 11 is a table of pitch notes which are broadcast from the National Bureau of Standards (Station WWV) in Washington, D.C. Two of these are on the ordinary short wave band, at approximately 20 and 30 metres (given as 15 and 10 megacycles). They are broadcast day and night, and I have received the note on 30 metres as a peculiar interrupted note. Both broadcasts are of the standard pitch, A=440, and are accurate to one part in ten million.

Mr. Bourn is a leading authority on electronic sound synthesis (he owns fifteen patents) and must have taken great pains over the ringing apparatus. Special steps were taken to produce a swinging effect, and he wired the machine to ring a plain course of Oxford T.B. Major only. A criticism was that the striking was too regular, and a device was introduced to make it slightly uneven!

A similar apparatus was in existence at the Compton factory in North Acton, to chime the Cambridge Quarters. Both were destroyed in the 1941 air raids. B. D. PRICE.

## Dedications

## BLAENAVON, MONMOUTHSHIRE.

Saturday, January 29th, was a red-letter day at Blaenavon on the occasion of the rededication and opening of the bells. The Bishop of Monmouth, in his address, said ringing was a healthy art, for the 'Diocesan Gazette' showed some remarkable records of long service among the ringers. The bells were rung for one purpose only, to call people to worship, but at Blaenavon as elsewhere many were deaf to the call they made.

Immediately following the dedicatory prayers the bells struck out for the first time, being in rounds by the local ringers, led by their veteran, Mr. Stokes. Following the service the Master of the Association, Mr. J. W. Jones, was chosen to take charge of the ringing for the day. The first touch he conducted, one of Grandsire Triples, was by ringers from various towers. During the day the four standard methods were rung, but the acknowledged titbit was one of Stedman Triples. A sumptuous tea was provided in the Church Hall.

The bells, originally a ring of six by Rudhall, cast in 1807, have been recast and two more added. They are now a most musical ring of eight with a tenor of 9½ cwt., the contract having been excellently carried out by Messrs. John Taylor and Co., who was represented by Mr. J. P. Fidler. The ringers at Blaenavon have always taken the greatest interest in their bells, and chiefly through their persistent efforts has the restoration been achieved. At present there are three generations of the family of Stokes and also quite a young band of ringers.

## STAFFORD ARCHDEACONRY SOCIETY

The quarterly meeting of the Society was held on January 22nd at Wolverhampton, when 80 ringers and friends attended. St. Paul's, Burton-on-Trent, was well represented, also ringers from Coventry, Stourbridge and Birmingham were welcomed. Service in St. Peter's Church, conducted by the Rector of Wolverhampton, was followed by tea.

At the business meeting a cheque for £30 18s. was presented to Mr. Herbert Knight, former secretary for 40 years. The presentation was made by Mr. C. Wallater, one of the oldest members, who voiced the opinion of every ringer present in saying that no society had ever had a better servant. Subscribers were from the Archdeaconry and as far afield as Bournemouth and Somerset.

New members elected included the entire band from Rugeley, where change ringing is now being practised. During the afternoon and evening methods rung included Cambridge Surprise Royal, Superlative Surprise Major and Stedman Cinques.

## A NOTE ON METHOD STRUCTURE

(Concluded from page 74.)

We come, then, to the last item of the London formula:—

7. CORRELATING STATS. — Unless the method is to be mutilated, these must come within the Front Cone and in its non-axial grid-sections. For Royal, no additions but two transfers are needed:—

(a) In the 5-6 UP grid-section: Last 4ths to 2nds.

(b) In the 7-8 UP grid-section: Last 1sts to 3rds.

For Maximus, (a) as in Royal, plus two transfers:—

(b) In the 7-8 UP grid-section: First 6ths to 2nds.

(c) In the 9-0 UP grid-section: First 8ths to 6ths.

Except for the 'reflections' of these in the second half of the Grid, no other alterations or additions of any kind are necessary.

Turning again to the 'Ideal' grid-patterns of London, which the interested student may have made as directed in an earlier paragraph, he may now erase the pencilled bell-paths at the grid-squares indicated in item 7 and rearrange as directed. Tracing down the paths to the grid-junction, the half-lead pivot is revealed as '4' in Royal and '7' in Maximus. To save an experimenter's time it may be stated that the author has thoroughly explored possible rearrangements, and has produced, over many years of patient research, about as many versions of Royal for London as there are letters in our alphabet. These versions successively improved until the qualifying extension emerged, conforming with every essential characteristic requirement. Indeed, London Royal is possible only with the 4th bell as pivot at the first half-lead; though the proof (by a process of elimination) is too lengthy for inclusion in this article. This 'residual' version satisfies all requirements of the principles laid down in paras. 'A' to 'O' above, and conforms strictly to the formula derived. Half-leads of Royal and Maximus are appended. They should be traced out for the grid-patterns and checked against London Minor and Major, and the formula.

These processes are universally applicable in change ringing methods and principles. But it must be emphasised that haphazard trials at 'extension' lead nowhere. The job must be tackled systematically and recorded step by step and checked. Knowledge of the theory of Stats, as mentioned in para. L above, is invaluable. All effort must be concentrated within the ambit of the formula; and the formula, be it remembered, is inherent in the basic form of the method. In London we are

fortunate in having both Minor and Major for this, the one being a check upon the other. Serious investigators, working on logical or mathematical lines, will soon discover the fallacy of reliance upon imitation of place-positions only, of the basic. (See end of para. N above.) Without other considerations, success is unattainable.

(It is regretted that abridgement may have made some parts of the argument rather more difficult to follow, but space considerations render this unavoidable.—A. Y. B.)
