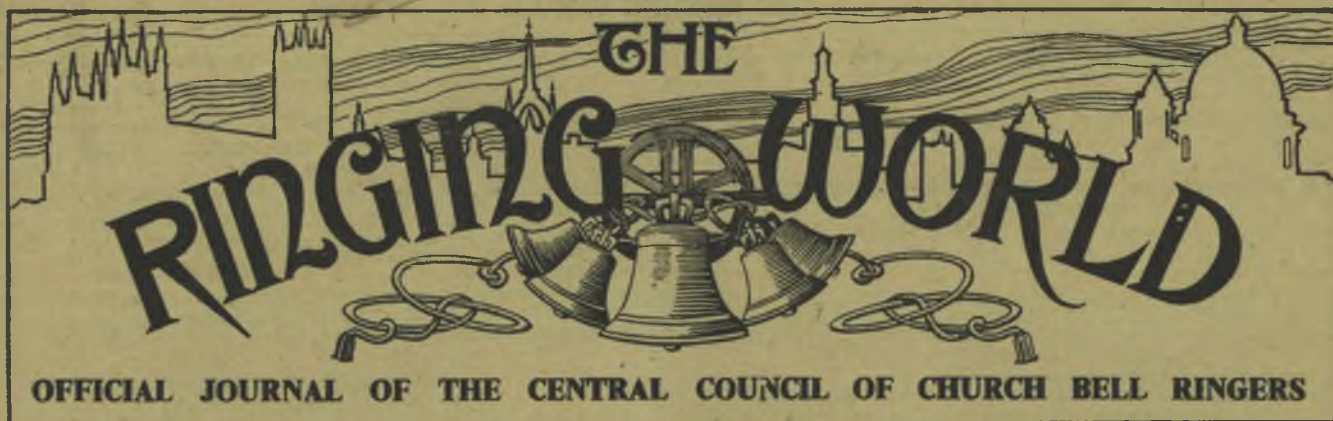




'The Ringing World' was founded in the year 1911 by John Sparkes Goldsmith, who remained its proprietor and editor until his death in 1942.

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THE SNOWDON DINNER

YORKSHIRE never does things by halves, and it was no surprise that the recent Snowdon Commemoration Dinner was fully up to the expectations of those who have attended previous functions at York, Sheffield, Rotherham and other centres. By a happy coincidence the date of the function happened to be the same as that arranged for the commencement of the Leeds Centenary Music Festival, arranged to commemorate the opening of Leeds Town Hall by Queen Victoria in 1858.

Visitors to Leeds found the city very full, but there were plenty of facilities for ringing, and the bells of St. Michael's and St. Chad's, Headingley, St. Francis' (R.C.) and Pudsey were available and well used. Owing to preparations for a television service, the twelve at the parish church could not be rung. Those who were fortunate enough to be present at the dinner will have been impressed by the careful arrangements for their comfort and entertainment made by the President, the Ven. C. O. Ellison, who, with his charming wife, moved about amongst the guests and made them feel really at home and welcome.

The toast of the evening was most ably proposed by Mr. W. Barton, who paid a high tribute not only to the work of the late Jasper Snowdon, but to many of the past officers of the Yorkshire Association. His speech made a great impression on all. The course of Grandsire Caters on handbells, which followed, was listened to with very close attention, and those who rang it are to be complimented on an excellent performance, fully up to the Yorkshire standard of good striking.

A very refreshing change was the addition of a lady speaker to the toast list. She was Mrs. C. C. Marshall (alias Tom Bowling to her old friends). She proposed the toast of 'The Visitors,' and charmed her audience by her wit and her championship of the merits of the Yorkshire scenery. It is doubtful, however, whether her claim that St. Chad's, Headingley, possessed the best ring of eight in the country could be sustained. Certainly they are good and a joy to ring upon.

It was also good to see the Secretary of the Central Council (Mr. E. A. Barnett) responding so ably to the toast. He was well received, and many expressions of

appreciation were to be heard regarding his attendance at the gathering. It was evident that he has now thoroughly won his spurs, and has the confidence of the Exercise.

A high spot of the evening was the songs given by Mr. Edward Yorke (happy name), of Ripon Cathedral. This gentleman provided the President with an opportunity of proving his adroitness. He informed the gathering that when the President asked him to appear, he said he didn't want any of the 'usual tripe.' The Archdeacon, in explaining this, said that what he really said was, 'We don't want "Watchman, what of the night"!'. This ingenious explanation simply brought the house down.

During the evening reference was made to the useful service of Miss Snowdon, who had for so many years continued the work of her father, William Snowdon, in providing the Exercise with instruction books. If ever a tribute was well earned, this one was.

Sympathetic reference was made to Mr. Percy J. Johnson, who unfortunately could not be present owing to ill health. He was certainly missed by many of the older members, who remembered with gratitude his great work as Secretary at a most difficult period of the Association's history.

Certainly the function was highly enjoyable and successful, and the thanks of all are due to Archdeacon Ellison and Mr. Marsh for the excellent arrangements.

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WILFRED WILLIAMS' PARTY'S PEAL TOUR OF SCOTLAND

'A cheil's amang you takin' notes,
And faith he'll prent it.'

—Robert Burns.

AFTER last year's highly successful tour of Southern Ireland, and the fact that there had previously been successful tours in England and Wales, it was perhaps inevitable that the seventh annual tour organised by Wilfred Williams should focus largely on Scotland.

Once again 13 ringers took part and confounded the superstitious critic who early on drew attention to the fact that we were 13 in number, had 13 peal attempts, and were sitting at table No. 13 by scoring 11 peals in eight different counties during the week. At least six of the party completed the ringing of peals in the four countries.

The party assembled on Friday, August 15th, at the King's Head Hotel, Loughborough, and four new faces gave us a new look, the contrasting styles of hat worn by two new members being reminiscent of the heyday of a famous politician. Derek gave us a fleeting glimpse of the vintage Cowley and showed a new 'slant' on petrol consumption by driving with two wheels on the pavement.

The following morning brought up our first peal attempt, and promptly at 10 a.m. we presented ourselves at the Bell Foundry, where we were pleased to renew acquaintance with Paul Taylor. The light ten here held no terrors for the selected band, and Yorkshire Royal was tapped off in average time. Lunch at a local café brought us quite by coincidence to sit by Mr. and Mrs. Alan Capstick, whom we were to meet at the end of our tour at Ambleside.

For our second attempt we were privileged to ring on the fine ten at All Saints', where Leslie Stevens had everything in readiness, a good peal of Cambridge resulting. We were sorry not to have met the Cheshire men who had just completed a tour in that area and who, we understand, listened to some of this peal; however, we were pleased to see Ralph Edwards in his new rôle as listener and spend an evening in his company.

NOTTINGHAM, RIPON, CARLISLE

On Sunday morning we were able to join Walter Nichols and his band to ring for morning service on the fine ten at St. Mary's, Nottingham, afterwards lingering awhile to hear the sonorous tones of Little John and the Exchange Quarters before leaving in glorious weather for Ripon and more ringing at the Cathedral. Then on again amid delightful scenery over the backbone of England to Carlisle, pausing en route to celebrate a birthday before sampling for the first time the experiment of State-owned hotels in a city which this year celebrates 800 years of independence.

On Monday there was an early start at St. Stephen's, Carlisle, where Jim Butterfield had everything ready. The bells, which can best be described with a well-known dramatic sweep of the hand, take some ringing, and Yorkshire was brought round with more determination than pleasure; however, we were pleased to ring a peal in honour of the octo-centenary of this city.

Paisley, our next objective, was reached in near record time despite a continuous stream of heavy traffic going south. The Presbyterian Church of St. James, a building richly endowed by the well-known Coats family, contains a fine ring of eight. Due to the oscillation of the tall spire, coupled with the fact that the bearing brackets of the back bells are bolted to the walls, these bells take some ringing, and we did well to score an excellent peal of Stedman, Philip making a good job of a badly-going bell in spite of being almost overcome for lack of fresh air due to the bad ventilation in the ringing chamber.

THE FIRST PEAL OF PUDSEY ROYAL IN SCOTLAND

Tuesday brought us to the 'plum' attempt of the tour—a peal on the magnificent ten at All Saints', Inveraray. It was an anxious party which left Glasgow in heavy rain for this delightfully-situated town at the head of Loch Fyne, anxious as the chances of ringing a peal here in heavy rain are very remote. However, our anxiety lessened with every mile, and though it remained overcast the rain kept away.

The scenery on this journey was undoubtedly the best encountered on our tour, the road winding alongside Loch Lomond, fleeting glimpses of Ben Lomond through the clouds and the rugged buttresses of Glen Coe being particularly impressive.

The tower of All Saints' Church, a great granite pile, stands almost on the shores of Loch Fyne and is open to the elements. Despite this, we found the bells in excellent condition, and we were soon fitting a set of new ropes while our bell-hanging friends checked the fittings. A quick lunch, then back to the tower for an attempt, which for some of us was the culmination of a 30-year ambition. Some preliminary rounds, in which Mr. and Mrs. F. Bennett, of Wombourne, Staffs, took part, and we were off to Pudsey Royal.

It took some time to settle down, but there was excellent ringing during the second and third hours, the issue being never in doubt. The volume of sound from these bells is terrific; it reverberates from the granite walls and descends on the ringers in one great cacophony, making it almost impossible to pick out any individual bell; nevertheless a truly majestic ring. Would-be aspirants for peals here will have to hurry—the floor of the ringing chamber is full of dry rot, and we estimated its life at no more than two years. Some of us were waiting in expectant imagination of the 'Guv'nor' stamping his foot at a 'trip' on these rotten boards and disappearing beneath us.

At the conclusion we were pleased to meet and to ring some Stedman Caters with Mr. E. H. Lewis, former president of the Central Council, who had driven from his home at Lochgilphead specially to see us. Another pleasant drive back to Glasgow, where we were in time to join the Cathedral ringers at their practice, receiving an extremely warm welcome. For many of us this was our first experience of Seages apparatus, which tested our ability to strike both Stedman Caters and Cambridge Royal.

'RHYTHM WONDERFUL'

Wednesday brought no improvement in the weather, and we left in heavy rain for Alloa, passing through Stirling with its commanding castle and skirting the great Wallace memorial. St. John's, Alloa, possesses a pleasant light eight and 'the Master Mind' ably piloted us through an uneventful peal of Cambridge. Here again, the ventilation of the ringing chamber left much to be desired, the walls streaming with condensation long before rounds came up. An interesting peal board in this tower records a peal of Grand sire Triples, the first on the bells, conducted by the late Stephen H. Wood, who was largely instrumental in founding the Scottish Association. On leaving the tower we were much heartened by the appreciative comments of a Scottish gentleman, who said: 'Gentlemen, I'm a Presbyterian, but religion doesn't matter here; that was a d— good show; the rhythm was wonderful.'

Retracing our steps and passing through the Bridge of Allan, we reached the High Kirk, Dunblane, a building of huge proportions with its chimney-like tower housing a fine Taylor eight, almost in the Ebbw Vale class, and on which a peal has yet to be rung. Our instructions here entailed finishing by 5 p.m., but unfortunately on raising the bells we had great difficulty with the clock hammers, and by

the time our bell-hanger had rectified this a peal attempt was out of the question; however, a quarter peal of Stedman Triples—the first quarter on the eight—was brought round in 47 minutes by D. G. Clift 1, A. H. Reed 2, G. McKay 3, R. G. Leale (conductor) 4, P. Mehew 5, N. V. Harding 6, D. P. Jones 7, W. A. Theobald 8.

Saying goodbye to Dunblane, we set out for Dundee, taking tea at Perth which enabled us to hear the fine carillon at St. John's Church; then on along the ever-widening Tay until at last we saw the famous bridge and the foundations of its ill-fated predecessor which still stand a little to the east of the present structure.

Some of us were awakened in the early hours of Thursday by the incessant ringing of the telephone which conveyed the sad news of the death of Norman's father-in-law; and leaving Dundee at 5.15 a.m., Norman covered the 400-odd miles to King's Lynn by tea time. A start was made for London at 10 a.m. on the musical eight at St. Paul's Cathedral, and was still going well when your chronicler left on the first stage of a long journey to South Wales. Unfortunately this attempt fired out after two hours' excellent ringing. We were, however, kindly entertained by the Rev. Harold Bembridge and soon forgot the disappointment at losing what would have been the first peal of Major on these bells.

FIRST PEAL OF BRISTOL IN SCOTLAND

In the afternoon a peal of Bristol Surprise Major—the first in Scotland—was rung at St. Mary's, Old Steeple. These bells do not go well, having been rehung by a local firm, and the peal here was well earned.

That evening we attended practice at St. Mary's Cathedral, Edinburgh, a magnificent ten, and received a warm welcome from Mr. Charles Raine, Master of the Scottish Association, and his fellow members. Afterwards Mr. Lloyd took the majority to sample the local brew, whilst Robin, and of course Philip, cultivated the acquaintance of local lady ringer Lois Beavers, who recently took part in a tour of Dorset with Robin.

Friday, and the now familiar rain saw a 10.30 start for Pudsey Major at St. James', Leith, where Derek made a good job of a difficult tenor (the Sally sticks in a hole in the ceiling). Despite local objectors—the lights were flashed on and off during the last hour—and a letter from the Vicar, which we did not see until too late, a good peal, another first in Scotland, was rung.

Lunch, then we say our goodbyes to Scotland, the Guv'nor jumping the traffic lights whilst waving goodbye to Miss Beavers, and we head once again for the border and the road into England.

Brampton was reached by driving through a thunderstorm and cloudburst, which reduced speed to 20 m.p.h. However, in spite of this storm, which continued throughout the ringing, the first 7-method peal for the Cumberland Association was safely brought round. We did not bargain, however, for the loud and ribald complaints—which were delivered by some local 'ladies' soon afterwards.

Saturday morning saw us at Cockermouth, where an excellent peal was rung on these fine but somewhat noisy bells: we received agreeable comments from appreciative local residents. From Cockermouth through the Lakes to Ambleside, where we had the misfortune to lose a College Youth peal of Yorkshire after 2½ hours' good ringing on this fine, heavy ring. The three non-members, together with Dennis Mottershead, who was holidaying in the district, with two locals, Alan Capstick and Stanley Richardson, rang four methods on the nice six at Langdale, bringing to an end another pleasant peal-ringing week.

Unfortunately, a late start by certain parties resulted in Bromham not being visited during this period, much to the consternation of the local incumbent, to whom the secretary has apologised on behalf of the Guild.

The canteen of Horne Lane Police Station, Bedford, proved to be an initial meeting place during the lunch-time period. Sandwiches and liquid refreshment were available there by Inspector Amor, of Bedford, his wife and daughter.

Ringing continued during the afternoon at the two churches of St. Paul and St. Peter, Bedford. St. Owen's, Bromham, was again open after lunch and visitors made up for the disappointment of not having had time to call there on the way into Bedford.

The business meeting was held in the lecture room at Police Headquarters, Bedford, by kind permission of the Chief Constable. The following officers were elected: President, Ex-Sgt. E. C. Turner (Leicester City); secretary/treasurer, P.C. J. A. Smith (Leics and Rutland); auditor, Sgt. J. Rawson (Leics and Rutland); committee, Ex-Sgt. C. Willmington and P.W.-Sgt. M. 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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

REPORTING DOUBLES

Dear Sir,—With reference to recent letters about the best way of reporting peals of Doubles, which include variations. In 'The Ringing World' of December 25th, 1955, I suggested the same style as used recently by Mr. Wratten, also suggesting that variations should be classified as 'Pleasure' methods. Thus a peal report would read: 'In two methods and two variations, Plain Bob, St. Simon's Bob, April Day Pleasure and Eynsham Pleasure.'

Personally, I fail to see the reason for learning these variations. If a band is capable of ringing Plain Bob and St. Simon's, instead of bothering with April Day and Eynsham, they could just as easily learn Candlesby and Rugby Slow Course both simple individual plain course methods. Also, it would be possible to ring extents without bobs, which are unnecessary nuisances in Doubles ringing. If an extent is called 'Plain, Candlesby, Candlesby, Plain three times' it will be seen that the 2nd rings only plain courses of Plain Bob, and with a learner ringing this, the interest of the other three 'inside' ringers is more easily maintained than it would be by calling an extent of Plain Bob, bobs with the 2nd behind.

That variations are slowly dropping out of favour is shown when we consider the 'top ten' Doubles methods rung in peals in recent weeks. These are: Grandsire (48), Plain Bob (38), Reverse Canterbury (24), St. Simon's (16), St. Martin's (15), Stedman (11), Winchendon (11), April Day (10), St. Nicholas' (9), Reverse St. Bartholomew (7). Of these, April Day is the only variation. Reverse St. Bartholomew is an irregular and the rest regular individual plain course methods. The regular methods could easily lead to a peal of Spliced in 21 methods.

The following all have plain courses the same as Plain Bob: Norfolk, Old, April Day, Kennington, Hudibras, Ready Money, Seighford, Dedworth, Blunderbuss, Old Hudibras and Dedworth Supreme.

If the Editor thinks they would be useful and of interest I am willing to write articles on Doubles variations and/or a systematic use of the Doubles Collection, including notes on spliced extents.—Yours sincerely,

'SALLIES IN MOTHBALLS'

Dear Sir,—Mr. L. W. Stevens' letter, as published in the October 3rd issue, contains some strong points which could easily be classed as 'home truths.'

No one can dispute the sad fact that, generally, service ringing is in a miserable state. Mr. Stevens may well ask what is being done to remedy the situation by those who assume responsibility.

It is all very well for the Central Council to carry out delicate peal analyses and to tabulate peal ringers in their order of merit and to establish that a method is 'so' or 'not so.'

It would be far better to tabulate the attendances of service ringers. Furthermore, no ringer should be permitted to partake in a peal unless he is a 'registered' member of a service band with a percentage of attendances to his credit.

Bells are provided for service ringing; whether this be 'rounds,' 'call-changes' or even 'method' should be of no concern.

The entire responsibility for ringing, or not ringing, cannot be allocated to the vicar. He is, or should only be, responsible through his tower captain, with whom he should work in close co-operation.

I respectfully suggest that a select committee is established to examine the matter and to make recommendations. An official brochure outlining all aspects of ringing would prove invaluable, especially to those requiring recruits. The brochure should be designed to dispel the generally accepted opinion that ringing is just rope-pulling. It could briefly cover history, Guilds and their activities, the Central Council and its duties, bell mechanism, call-changes, method, the social activities, etc., etc. It could contain a page for local information to be completed by the local tower captain and a 'tear out' for the convenience of the probable recruit.

As a service ringer I thank Mr. Stevens for bringing the matter of service non-ringing to light, and sincerely hope that it will receive further discussion and suggestions for improvement through your columns.—Yours faithfully,

BELLS AT HEYDON, CAMBS

Dear Sir,—Mr. Dove's Guide is incorrect concerning Heydon on two counts. Firstly, because it is not in Essex but a mile or two over the border in Cambridgeshire, in a little wooded enclave 450 feet up on the brink of the bare chalk edge of the East Anglian heights near Great Chishill. There is nothing higher eastward from here, by the way, till 400 miles across the North Sea into Germany have been traversed.

It was from that country that a bomber came in the war and jettisoned its load on sleepy Heydon, one bomb destroying the nave and tower of Holy Trinity Church, so that, secondly, the bells are no longer.

I went some years ago to see the ruins and saw fragments of wheels and fittings; but there is a happier conclusion to the story: the church has now been rebuilt in Gothic style as a war memorial, and—good news for ringers—a very plain brick tower added, in modernistic contrast, containing a brand-new, but still unoccupied, steel frame for six bells, and a clock mechanism. So perhaps Heydon may soon qualify for 'The Ringer's Guide' once more.—Yours faithfully,

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THE DRIVE FOR BETTER SERVICE RINGING

Dear Sir,—When the College of Campanology was founded, about two-and-a-half years ago, its aims and objects were shown to include, amongst others, two that have received publicity otherwise in recent months, namely, the specific use of handbells in the teaching of hunting in method ringing, and that particular objective of ringing training which has special reference to service ringing.

In regard to the latter it is encouraging that the Central Council has set up a committee to explore the Sunday service ringing position generally throughout the Exercise.

The object of this letter is to confirm that the College, in wishing the committee all success in its good work, will continue its efforts in this field, especially now by urging all members of the College to assist the committee in every possible way, and by offering the committee such relevant information, gathered in College teaching activities, as the committee may consider to be useful in their investigations.

Experience of College tutors and helpers in the past two years tends to confirm the aptness of the contents of the three lists published on page 577 of 'The Ringing World' for September 5th, 1958, and shows that while these lists, as given, tend to overlap somewhat yet they do, in large measure, fairly present the picture, but that to complete it *additions* may be made, of which the following are but some examples:—
To first list—'Towards Improvement'

1. *Practical* recognition of ringers as church workers. For example: (a) Providing optional seating for ringers, who necessarily enter later than other members of congregation. (b) Having a 'Ringers' Sunday' annually, with handbell touches in the nave, sermons on ringing activity, ringers reading lessons, etc. (c) Admission to membership of the band by intermission in a church service.

2. *Encouragement* of younger members of congregation to make their Church membership vital by a practical Church activity, i.e., taking up ringing and making service ringing their contribution.

3. *Stressing* the need for learners to undertake, even if they leave the parish, to continue with their service in this way, the result being frequently of benefit locally through exchange.

4. *100 per cent. objective* of service ringing attendance—competitive.

5. *Encouraging visitors* who are ringers, through notices of ringing times, especially in the church porch, and/or in 'The Ringing World' occasionally.

To second list—'Success Factors'

1. *Devoting part* (at any rate) of the regular ringing practice (in a way similar to that of choir practice) to practise with the set object of ringing some specific method or touch, or even call-changes, for the following Sunday services. This should apply to all but fully experienced bands of good ringers; and the College advocates the practice with all bands containing learners and/or improvers.

2. *Rigidly keeping* the Sunday service ringing to within the capabilities of good performance by the band attending, and giving all a turn who can ring rounds well.

3. *Setting example*, by more experienced ringers, of regularity of attendance at service ringing, and of aiming at faultless performance and striking, by strict attitude towards these ends, particularly during service ringing.

4. *Payment?* A recommended alternative incentive towards regular attendance is the use of small badges of office (e.g., as worn in button-hole), made available to ringers becoming eligible, in a tower, for Sunday service ringing, and worn to the church service for which they ring only if the holder has not been absent from the previous service(s). Absences are 'made up' by subsequent equivalent attend-

ances, before the badge can be worn again, as determined by the tower captain. This idea may be found particularly useful among younger ringers who take a pride in their service.

To the third list—

'Full-band Retention Difficulties'

1. *Lack of Training Programme* and of a Ringing Progress Plan. These are two essentials, all the time, plus interest.

2. *Neglect of the '150 per cent. Minimum' objective.* This follows from the practical need to get together and maintain a band of twice as many ringers as bells in the tower, with special efforts to raise numbers again as soon as they fall to one-and-a-half times as many ringers; e.g., six bells—nine ringers.

3. *Neglected and therefore repulsive ringing chamber.* Have a rota of ringers to assist the steeplekeeper in keeping it as clean, bright and attractive as possible.

4. *Attitude of senior members to junior ones.* In these times all members must be made to feel welcome, especially by the seniors.

5. *Neglect of Public Relations.* Some ringers tend to drift away from service ringing when they learn that there is local objection to ringing. Often this objection is due to lack of liaison with local residents, whose lack of interest in ringing may turn to objection. Experience has shown that even fierce opposition can be overcome by contact, by compromise and even by an invitation to the ringing chamber!

It is emphasised that the foregoing additional items are cited only as examples, others being forthcoming, no doubt, as the result of the survey. Experience shows that Sunday service ringing can be extended and improved by making the necessary co-operative efforts. The College will do all it can to help, especially towards the solution of relevant problems that may be submitted.—Yours faithfully,

TEACHING RHYTHM

Dear Sir,—To the enthusiastic learner, as to his teacher, your article (October 3rd, page 633) is a challenge, and one of them is moved to make a few observations.

Your contributor writes: 'He should also be taught to listen to and recognise all the bells.' This, obviously, is the only sure road to good striking, but it does not seem to be generally understood how many people have ears so defective for music that they just cannot carry in mind a note to recognise it when next they hear it.

A personal example may be allowed to illustrate the point: the ability to utter the responses less flagrantly out of tune than the petitions offered by many of the clergy—fair evidence of the extent of the defect—but complete inability to decide whether the treble was the bell in thirds or in fifths when listening to a good call-change band ringing each sequence ten times. One has only to listen to bad striking by a band which should be competent to be forced to agree that many ringers are in the same plight, even if not always aware of it.

That ringers generally do not appreciate how common the defect is may be in part because so many of them enter the belfry by way of the choir. Nor do the normally endowed readily imagine the condition of tone-deafness, or the severity of the handicap with which the afflicted have to contend; to draw attention to which is the chief purpose of this letter.

Surely anyone listening to a piece of ringing can tell whether the striking is good? In rounds on not more than eight bells it should be fairly simple for anyone to hear his own striking (not necessarily to strike well!) just by counting. On higher numbers, especially in the middle, it is not so easy, perhaps because the ear receives more overlapping of notes and overtones. The speed at which the notes assail the ear bears greatly on the difficulties of the unmusical.

To alter speed correctly for going up or down, and especially for dodging, is altogether more difficult, requiring, as it does, a break in the individual rhythm, and the musically deaf are at a grave disadvantage. They know whether the ringing is going well or ill, but cannot easily tell what the faults are nor with whom they lie. Since they cannot distinguish their own bell, how can they help themselves? The conception of gaps clicking along in the mind certainly may help some, but depends ultimately on recognising the sound of their bell.

On familiar rings, the gauging of rope movement is obviously a tremendous help, and I suppose with enough practice will enable tolerable striking. In learning this, the system suggested by W. F. M. should be invaluable.

Another aid which one of the afflicted finds as helpful as any is knowing that the bell speaks just before it, and the rope, come to rest. The thought may go thus: Sounds good—good—good—clip (probably my fault, though it might be someone bashing me, note for next blow)—better—good—not so good—right—crash! just as I pulled off, so I wasn't in that; Martin again, I suppose, if only he'd listen to his bell. Where am I now? Keep your mind on what you're doing, ass!

Teachers might exploit the fact that even the profoundly unmusical may be able to hear and appreciate the rhythm of odd-bell ringing, especially when the bells behind are dodging; this, I submit, is why bad strikers can sometimes make a more passable job of the work behind in Stedman than of anything else. On the other hand, Plain Bob, rung so much by the learner, may seem, except at the dodging, a meaningless succession of notes, the open lead an irritating hiatus scarcely to be distinguished from a bad blow, and a little bell behind at backstroke positively silly.

These lines are written, sir, in humility and deference, and in the spirit of the old aphorism 'Set a thief to catch a thief'—Yours faithfully,

Autumn Tour Of Society Of Friends Of The Exercise

A RECENT report in the 'R.W.' gave some account of the 'Friends' Whitsun tour and concluded as the writer was journeying to Honiton to take part in the ringing weekend which had been planned back in May.

As it turned out, only three people arrived in Honiton on September 26th in time to ring, and since no one met us no ringing was done. 'Ah well,' said the three at Honiton, 'the rest will turn up at Ottery.' And it was so. The mayor-elect of East Budleigh and organiser for S.F.E., Cyril ('Pickles') Savage, was there on the churchyard steps to welcome all and sundry. Brian Bladon and Lesley Howes added respectability to the scene. The tuneful Taylor eight (18 cwt.) at Ottery were rung until 9 p.m. Later, in the King's Arms, East Budleigh, a count of heads revealed only one absentee.

Saturday, September 27th, was fair and bright. 'Leave E. Budleigh 8.15 a.m. sharp' read the programme, so at 8.25 a.m. we left, all in cars. Around the Exeter by-pass and just west of Aliphington to the village of Ide (pronounced 'Eede') went the convoy. There we found Bill Carter, safe after his battles with B.R. The six bells (8 cwt.) at Warner were used for sundry methods before we charged into the foothills of Dartmoor, en route for Dunsford.

Call-change ringers' ropes at Dunsford (6, 14 cwt.), and more harvest decorations, set the pattern for the rest of the day. The problem of coping with two or three feet of spare, single rope was solved in various ways.

Crafty roadmanship by the organiser effectively stopped any overtaking on the hill up to Bridford (6, 9 cwt.). Those not ringing admired the 16th century rood screen or chatted with the local captain of ringers. The Harriers Arms was briefly taken by storm and then left to subside whilst we journeyed on to Lustleigh. As the crow flies, this is about five miles from Bridford, and those who pinned their faith to the Ordnance Survey and ignored grass growing in the middle of the roads, went straight up over Kiln Down, past Torquay's reservoirs, and so down into the picture postcard village of Lustleigh. The six tuneful bells at Lustleigh (11 cwt.) were coaxed into giving good music.

BOILING RADIATORS

Late, as ever, we left for Manaton and Dartmoor. Boiling radiators over Trendlebere Hill and no time to admire Becka Falls were our lot. The tower steps were climbed at Manaton (6, 8 cwt.) and the view of Haytor Down from the top was worth the climb.

Tow ropes will be carried on all cars' read the programme, and, en route to North Bovey and lunch, we almost wished that Cyril had taken his own advice. On North Bovey Green, 'A person shall not upon the ground, beat, shake, sweep, brush or cleanse any carpet, drugget, rug or mat or any other fabric retaining dust or dirt.' So cars were left on the green, uncleaned in deference to the by-law, and we rang Bob Minor, very fast, on the six bells (12 cwt.).

'Mountain guides will meet the party at Chagford.' Perhaps our performance on the only ring of eight (18 cwt.) encountered that day deterred the guides, but these Taylor bells went well. On to Gidleigh where the Rev. S. C. M. Scott's father welcomed us to ring on his five bells (8 cwt.), and their minor key was not disagreeable.

Local ringers welcomed us at South Tawton (6, 11 cwt. in E) and stayed to watch some scientific Doubles. No doubt the sight of Cyril climbing the sally of the fourth bell convinced them that their bells were better rung 'off the balance.'

'Tea—half hour' was next on the programme, and most members rang at Spreyton Church (6, 12½ cwt.) before eating. After recrossing the main road, the large square at Drewsteignton

was found to be useful for parking. Ringing on the fine six (18 cwt.) went well, too. Eleven towers gone, two to go.

Choreton Bishop bells (6, 14 cwt.) were rung as darkness descended, and later Tedburn St. Mary's Church was located. As it lay about a mile from the village and off the main road, discovery was difficult in the dark. The bells (6, 10 cwt.) at this tower are rung from a gallery, and a band of ladies performed well at Stedman. Somewhat weary, the Friends 'tanked up' at the King's Arms (Tedburn and East Budleigh) and found strength to hold a 'public meeting' at the village hall, under the chairmanship of the Mayor.

For Matins, the Friends dispersed to ring on Sunday at Otterton and Woodbury as well as East Budleigh. A large bunch of flowers was presented to Mrs. Salway, landlady of the King's Arms, and all hoped she would be fit enough to accommodate ringers once more soon.

Sunday afternoon, and the homeward journey began. By a somewhat roundabout route we called at Thorverton (8, 14 cwt.) and had some good ringing. After tea in Tiverton, we regrettably passed by St. Peter's Church and went on to ring for Evensong at Dulverton (8, 17 cwt.). The party then dispersed.

FIRST PEAL PERFORMANCES

By F. T. BLAGROVE

THE following is believed to be a complete schedule of Principles rung to peals. It is a very short list, and apart from Stedman, none of the methods can be called standard. Peals in new Principles are very rare indeed. Several reasons probably contribute to this lack of interest in Principles, such as the difficulty of ringing without a fixed hunt bell and lack of musical compositions. Also, of far more importance, the production of the methods themselves has one great difficulty. For although hunt-controlled methods can be written down and require no proof of truth in the plain course, it is necessary to check the plain course of any Principle to ensure that it is true within itself. Now that the composition of peals for hunt-controlled methods has almost become an automatic art, our leading composers may have to turn to Principles for fresh fields of composition.

Stedman Triples.—5,040 at St. Peter Mancroft on October 25th, 1731, and at St. Michael Coslany on December 6th, 1731, by local bands of Norwich Scholars.

Stedman Caters.—5,076 at St. John's, Horsleydown, Southwark, on May 28th, 1787, by the College Youths.

Stedman Cinques.—6,204 at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, Westminster, on October 6th, 1788, by the College Youths.

Stedman Major.—5,037 at Aston on February 17th, 1856, by the St. Martin's Youths.

Stedman Royal.—5,184 at Aston on October 21st, 1876, by the St. Martin's Youths.

Bob Major Triples.—5,040 at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields on May 20th, 1738, by the Union Scholars, 'containing the Treble Leads and Bobs of ye complete peal of 40320 Bob Major, Eight In.' The method is Original with bobs made on the front (thirds instead of lead) and the composition is believed to have had all the bells affected by bobs.

Original Triples.—5,040 at Bushey on October 16th, 1926, by the Hertford County Association. The composition had the seventh acting as a plain hunt bell throughout.

Original Major.—5,000 at Ranmoor, Sheffield, on August 26th, 1908, by the Yorkshire Association.

Duffield Major.—5,000 at Duffield on October 8th, 1887, by the Midland Counties Association.

Duffield Royal.—5,040 at Duffield on March 19th, 1888, by the Midland Counties Association.

Duffield Maximus.—5,040 at Birmingham on March 17th, 1891, by the St. Martin's Youths.

Forward Major.—5,088 at Deritend on February 8th, 1889, by the Birmingham and District Amalgamated Association.

Forward Royal.—5,000 at Loughborough on January 3rd, 1890, by the Midland Counties Association.

Forward Maximus.—5,040 at Birmingham on January 13th, 1903, by the St. Martin's Youths.

Erin Triples.—5,040 at Gateshead on June 5th, 1909, by the Durham and Newcastle Diocesan Guild.

Erin Caters.—5,076 at North Shields on July 12th, 1909, by the Durham and Newcastle Diocesan Guild.

Erin Cinques.—5,063 at West Bromwich on September 23rd, 1911, by the Stafford Archdeaconry Society.

Aston Major.—5,008 at Handsworth on September 18th, 1909, by the Midland Counties Association.

Handsworth Major.—5,056 at Handsworth on June 11th, 1910, by the Midland Counties Association.

Handsworth Royal.—5,120 at Aston on November 26th, 1910, by the Aston Youths.

Shilton Major.—5,184 at Earl Shilton on April 9th, 1932, by the Midland Counties Association.

Spliced Erin and Stedman Triples.—5,040 at Bushey on August 26th, 1939, by the Hertford County Association.

Spliced Erin and Stedman Caters.—5,133 at Newcastle upon Tyne on January 27th, 1925, by the Durham and Newcastle Diocesan Guild.

Scientific Triples.—5,040 at Hampton-on-Thames on July 5th, 1958, by the Middlesex County Association.

Of the above methods, Maidstone Major and Cox's Caters are not known.

Stedman Major and Royal as rung by the St. Martin's Youths were in Johnson's variation and not that given in Shipway.

Aston is believed to be the same as Handsworth, but with the Double Kent places in 3-4 instead of 5-6.

Scientific Triples can be found in 'The Ringing World' of July 18th, 1958.

Forward is a treble bob hunt for all the bells, with Kent places in 3-4.

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REVIEW

'A Handbook of Grandsire Caters.' Edgar C. Shepherd. (1s. post free, from Mr. R. F. B. Speed, Four Winds, School Lane, Stretton-on-Dunsmore, Rugby.)

One pleasing feature of the present day is the work of a few expert ringers in publishing, usually at a loss it must be admitted, pamphlets and handbooks on a variety of topics. Within the last year we have had made available to us through the efforts of individuals, belfry prayers, beginners' helps and collections of Doubles and Triples methods. Certainly Mr. Shepherd is to be thanked for having filled yet another need of the interested ringer.

At a time when the music of ringing appears to take second place to the intricacy of method construction, it is refreshing to find Mr. Shepherd, through his latest contribution to the study of change-ringing, reminding us of the attractions of Grandsire Caters, generally accepted as the most musical of methods.

Here we have, in ten pages of typescript, all that a conductor needs to be told about the subject. After a prefatory note—not quite so complete as one would wish—there follow 70 touches of various lengths from 269 to 593 and six excellent quarter peals. Next we are presented with a 'utility' peal in three almost equal parts, which the average conductor could learn in a quarter of an hour. We are then given a table with 12 opening courses in the titmums, 12 in the 'inverted' titmums and 12 courses to turn the bells from titmums to the handstroke-home position. A most useful transposition table shows us the callings that leave the three back bells undisturbed. The handbook concludes with brief but adequate notes on the proof of Grandsire Caters.

A minor criticism is that the terms '8-2', '9-2', '89' and '98' are not explained in the text, and experience has shown that these are not usually understood by beginners. A further point is the unwieldy format of '7 x 8½', but the use of the typewriter and the need to keep down the cost of production have dictated this.
